

FROM THE MANSE



Dear Friends

Remember learning to drive? Even though it was well over forty years since I took my driving test, it is well ingrained in my memory: the pre-test nerves, the stupid mistakes, the mastering of a new skill, and then the delight of removing the L plates and being a fully-fledged (new) driver.

Learning is part of the Christian way too. The tests are there along the way, but it is a lifetime exercise. We do not drop our Christian L plates. We remain learners for life, disciples, followers or pupils of

Jesus, learning from our successes and mistakes, from the teaching and example of others, and the discovery of our own gifts and talents.

Two key elements of learning are:

Listening (for Christians this means listening to the words of the Bible on the one hand, and to each other and to the world on the other). Christian theologian Karl Barth states that we should 'take our Bible and take our newspaper and read both. But interpret newspapers from our Bible.'

Practice (trying things out, putting into practice the teaching of Jesus, turning words into action).

Lent begins on Wednesday 1st March, a time in the church's life when we focus on discipleship as we move towards the great Easter celebration.

It's a time not just to give something up, but to learn new things too. In 2017 we at Fleet URC will be exploring ten areas of discipleship, called 'Holy Habits'. (For more information see page 4). It is hoped that you may feel called to explore one or more of these areas in a deeper sense.

During Lent our Sunday worship will be exploring what we believe about God. In a world where for many people God seems a delusion, we turn to some key stories in the Bible that picture God as real and living, as creative and compassionate, as mysterious and wondrous, loving and true.

There's a prayer from the lona Community that prays for 'those who need to forget the God they do not believe in and meet the God who believes in them.'

This is the God Jesus shows us through his story telling, his words and actions, his sacrifice on a cross and victory over death, his presence here and now. He is the good Saviour; he is also the great Teacher, pointing us in the right direction and enabling us to truly live life.

So wherever we are on the Christian journey, let's remain learners, listening and practising, growing in confidence in the One who gives and teaches us life.

LENT: WHAT IS IT ALL ABOUT?



Lent is the period of 40 days which comes before Easter in the Christian calendar. Beginning on Ash Wednesday, Lent is a season of reflection and preparation before the celebrations of Easter. By observing the 40 days of Lent, Christians replicate Jesus Christ's sacrifice and withdrawal into

the desert for 40 days. Lent is marked by fasting, from both food and activities.

Whereas Easter celebrates the resurrection of Jesus after his death on the cross, Lent recalls the events leading up to and including Jesus' crucifixion by Rome. This is believed to have taken place in Roman occupied Jerusalem.

The Christian churches that observe Lent in the 21st century (and not all do significantly) use it as a time for prayer and penitence. Only a small number of people today fast for the whole of Lent, although some maintain the practice on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. It is more common these days for believers to surrender a particular vice, such as favourite foods, or smoking. Whatever the sacrifice, it is a reflection of Jesus' deprivation in the wilderness and a test of self-discipline.

Why 40 days?

Forty is a significant number in Jewish-Christian scripture:

- In Genesis, the flood which destroyed the earth was brought about by 40 days and nights of rain.
- The Hebrews spent 40 years in the wilderness before reaching the land promised to them by God.
- Moses fasted for 40 years before receiving the Ten Commandments on Mount Sinai.
- Jesus spent 40 days fasting in the wilderness in preparation for his ministry.

Most Christians regard Jesus' time in the wilderness as the key event for the duration of Lent.

East and West

Both the Eastern and Western churches observe Lent, but they count the 40 days differently.



The Western Church excludes Sundays (which is celebrated as the day of Christ's resurrection), whereas the Eastern Church includes them.

The churches also start Lent on different days. Western churches start Lent on the seventh Wednesday before Easter Day (called Ash Wednesday); Eastern churches start Lent on the Monday of the seventh

week before Easter and end it on the Friday nine days before Easter. Eastern churches call this period the 'Great Lent'.

The last week of Lent is called Holy Week.

May I invite you to prepare for Lent in your own way, not by just abstaining from something you enjoy, but by choosing a spiritual discipline which will enable you to journey through Lent and beyond with Jesus.

CELEBRATING 500 YEARS OF THE REFORMATION



In 1517, Martin Luther, a German monk, was so disillusioned with Roman Catholic theology and practices that he nailed 95 'theses' on the church door at Wittenburg. These complaints against the doctrine of the Catholic Church triggered others throughout Europe to speak out against 'indulgences', which included monetary payments to the church to ensure that your soul entered heaven. This was common practice at the time.

Luther was convinced that God was a God of Love, not a God who needed to be appeased. This act of Martin Luther became the bedrock of a movement which is called *The Reformation*.

During 2017 the United Reformed Church will be remembering Martin Luther, and how his theology still impacts our worship and mission today.



PALANI MISSION

Palani Mission was founded in 1970, and is situated in Tamil Nadu, a rural province in South India.



It is linked to St Thomas' Church, and although access is remote, the church regularly has over one thousand people worshipping on a Sunday. Along with many other mission challenges, the church also supports a small hospital. At Fleet URC we are financially supporting two girls who are undertaking midwifery training. They will enable better health care in the area, and bring much needed support to the lower caste families who can live in severe poverty.

Please continue to support this partnership between Palani Mission and Fleet URC.

30.09.2016:

We have a small theatre and a cinema and a plethora of pubs and hotels in the town and in the surrounding villages. We have sampled a few restaurants on the banks of the Kennet and Avon Canal, which skirts the town, and were pleased with the experience. We look forward to exploring more.

We are now part of the congregation in St Andrews URC in Devizes, and have been made very welcome and part of the community. It is lovely to be able to see our daughter and son in law more often, and to go out with them. It only takes five minutes to travel to where they live. Fleet Angels patrol the streets of Fleet on Saturday nights to be there for the vulnerable, whether they be drunk, lost, hurt or simply looking for someone to listen. This is truly demonstrating God's love through actions.

Jeremy Dunk, Project Leader of Fleet Angels, has written an inspiring account of his work which may be read here: http://fleet.urc.org.uk/because-youre-worth-it/. He writes:



In the coming weeks we hope to begin a recruitment drive as volunteer numbers have dropped in the past few years from around 40 to about half that number.

Many reading this article may be saying, "It's not for me," or "I couldn't be out all night," but I would ask everyone to consider; as Christians we are ALL called to love God and to love one another Fleet Angels are the visible proof of God's presence on the streets of Fleet; they say 'actions speak louder than words'.

So, I would make the following, simple, 3-step challenge:

- With an open mind, seek out the Fleet Angels in your congregation;
- Talk to them. Ask them about their experiences—why they do it, and what it is like;
- Think and reflect on what you can do to help. If you would like to see
 what it's like, then please come out as an observer—just one night, no
 obligation, no expectation! If you don't feel it is for you, then perhaps
 you could offer to pray when the Fleet Angels are out on patrol—
 prayer support is vital!

Supporting Prisons

Sarah Smith, a local prison support volunteer, has sent us the following request, saying "we are desperate for more help":

I would like to tell you a little about Coldingley Prison at Bisley. It is a modern category C prison where men are prepared for life outside and have job training. Time and again research has shown that prisoners who keep close family ties are less likely to re-offend, and this is where we can help.

The visits hall at Coldingley is bright and airy with a play area for visiting children. The children can come and play with volunteers while their

parents have a few moments private conversation.



family days.

To keep the play area running we need volunteers. Play volunteers can be anyone—all you need is to enjoy children, be able to get to the prison, have a DBS check, and fill in the prison volunteer admission form. Some people join the rota with a friend and others go alone, a good chance to make new friends and have a natter when the children are all occupied.

No one is asked to go more than once a month, to cover the play area alone, or to do an afternoon where they have a prior commitment. The play area is open on Saturday afternoons, 2.15—3.45 pm, and on Thursday afternoons in school holidays, plus other special

This simple act can make a real difference to prisoners, their families, and society as a whole. The children are almost all delightful, and I really enjoy my afternoons there.
