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The beginning shall remind us of the end. T.S. Elliot

How many people have started to read a book, but never read it to the end? There have been occasions, when I have started reading a book, only to put it down when something else crops up, or have been distracted by another book, so never finishing the original one I was reading. I don't think I am alone in this experience, but maybe there is something to learn in why we only read part of the story, and not to the final chapter.

During 2016, we have heard many stories of Jesus and how the early church coped with challenges, but linking faith in today's context can be a real challenge for most people.

God desires us to flourish, and to enable that flourishing to occur, we need to look at the Gospel writers for guidance and inspiration.

Each writer begins their Gospel with a different emphasis, and the same is said for their endings, however all invite us to discipleship.

It seems fitting at as we reflect on 2016 as a church community, I would want to explore these four Gospel 'endings' in a little more detail, and how they relate to us as disciples.

Mark's ending: Lost or suspended?

Mark's Gospel is dramatic, quick and some may say written in haste, and the same could be said for the ending, abrupt, short and inconclusive. However, there are many unanswered questions relating to the ending in Mark.

- Who rolled away the stone?
- Who was the mysterious man in white?
- Did the disciples actually go to Galilee and see him?

The human fear which has confronted Jesus throughout Mark's Gospel is there at the very end. No wonder we find Mark's ending disappointing. We expect him to give us facts. In other words, we expect him to do what the others writers will do, go spread the good news; but there is a hesitancy.

Our discipleship can be a little like Mark's ending, enthusiastic about hearing Jesus stories that nurture our faith, yet unsure of **'what to do next'**. We can sometimes feel suspended in our discipleship, unsure of which direction to turn and feel lost.

Mark's ending is an invitation to read and read again Mark's Gospel from the beginning. It is about perseverance and commitment and being given another chance; that discipleship is personal journey where we will not always feel lost or suspended but be found and active.

Matthew's ending; The Great Commission

Matthew's Gospel is a teaching and caring Gospel and many may feel that he has rounded off the Gospel in an appropriate way, otherwise called the Great commission **'Go make disciples of all nations'**. However, if we look a little further, the disciples must travel all the way to Galilee if they want to see Jesus, it would seem that their faith needs to be tested. Matthew's Gospel has Jesus directing the disciples precisely where they should go, and even addresses the disciple's doubts.

However, there is someone else who is influencing the ending of Matthew's Gospel, and that is the figure of Moses. The Exodus story sees Moses being commissioned by God, with words **'I am, sent you'** ringing in his ears. Matthew has Jesus standing on the shore, commissioning the disciples.

Evangelising is not an easy thing to do, but God knows what are our strengths and will use us to help bring people to Christ. In a gentle non-threatening manner, the Spirit can help us engage in conversations that can bring healing, or a listening ear that can bring relief, or a smile that can break boundaries. It is an invitation for us to enter the story and Jesus gives us each a blessing **'I am with you always to the end of time'**.

Luke's 'loose ends'

Luke's Gospel is well structured, and tells the story of Jesus, carefully, slowly, prayerfully and elegantly. It is a Gospel that places Jesus where it matters and that in the centre of community and relationships. The last sentence in the gospel is like a fairy tale ending, for all ends happily **'since the Messiah had entered into glory'** but what next? The disciples will arrive to earth with a big bump, and are not going to settle to domestic bliss, but are sent on a

journey and mission to spread the good news, the Gospel story, and this is where the ‘loose ends’ come in. Acts gathers those loose ends and helps us understand what it truly means to walk the talk, not just by ourselves, but with other people of faith. The one question we need to remember is that Luke is the first part of a two-part volume, the second book being Acts.

.As disciples, we need to remember that even though we are called by God as individuals, God calls us to service and community, to enrich others people and well as ourselves.

John: Endings and Beginnings

John brings another dimension to the theme. The ending of his Gospel, involves a meal and commissioning, but the final scene also involves forgiveness. For Peter, who denied Jesus three times, needs to be restored before he can fulfil his task of *‘tending lambs’*. Jesus’ words to Peter show clearly that the story has not come to an end, as there will always members of the flock needing to be cared for, and disciples still to be made. For John’s Gospel the need for hospitality, community, love and forgiveness are the signs of discipleship and the flourishing of the Kingdom of God.

For John’s Gospel, his ending is not the end of the story, but the beginning.

Final Thoughts

Why have I spent time on a ‘Bible study’ for my AGM letter?

The themes on the ‘endings’ of the gospel stories, all relate to Jesus’ resurrection, a time of new beginnings and new life. It is not the end, but only the beginning.

We will be reflecting on 2016 in our AGM, and as the year close we look ahead to 2017, not knowing what it will bring, but knowing that Christ is beside each one of us.

We are all in relationship with God and each other, and that relationship is constantly being challenged in the light of the changing world we inhabit. As disciples, we are all part of the Gospel story, and that story will continue until the end of time.

However, relationships are the glue that holds community together, without being in a fulfilling relationship with Christ, we are not the person we were

meant to be, however the call to be part of the 'fabric' of the gospel story stirs deep within each of us.

At Fleet URC, we have been sojourners on a discipleship road with others, not just from our church, but from other dominations, other cultures. We are all called to tend lambs, to love our neighbour, to walk the extra mile, to forgive, and to accept people who have yet to hear the good news of Christ.

May God, who is our Creator, Redeemer and Sustainer journey with us, as we remember the past, encounter God in the present, and with faith, face the future.

Church Accounts Year Ending 31 December 2016

Headline Commentary:

The 2016 opening balance was £45,856 to which the annual total income of £76,759 was added. The latter exceeded our annual expenditure of £69,213 by some £7,546 thus providing a closing balance of £53,402. Major income streams came from the coffee mornings, the premises letting and the Autumn craft fair; our thanks must go to the catering team, Brian Armes and Darrell Henderson respectively.

There is still more planned repair work in the 2017 budget and to this end a sum of £28,000 has been set aside to complete future projects agreed by Church meeting.

Our distribution of gifts totalled £9,496 and was shared amongst local and overseas organisations; in partnership with the Palani Mission church we have and will continue to fund the training of two midwives in southern India.

Our reserves remain at £25,000.

I would like to thank Gill Durbin, Gilbert Black, Brian Armes and John Johnstone for their support throughout 2016.

Grounds

We held a meeting about money, so that the girls could learn how to add coins together and how to give change when helping at an event.

In April, we started a new badge called 'I Love Adventures'. We learned about the different habitats in which an animal could live and went to find some at Fleet Pond.

We let the Rainbows choose a theme for one of our meetings in June. They decided they wanted a meeting about Pirates and Fairies where they could dress up. We also decorated some fairy statues and made pirate cakes.

To make the most of the nice weather we had a lot of outdoor meetings in the Summer term. We went to Oakley park to follow a peg trail through the woods, and we also had a garden party at the hall.

After the Summer holidays, we had 7 weeks of 'Rainbow Meetings', where each week was themed on a different colour. We also ate food that matched the colour of the meeting.

- In September, the girls chose to paint canvasses to send to a children's hospice for the Scouting and Guiding partnership. We were impressed that they put so much thought into this idea.

We handed out bags with sweets and a decorated jam jar with instructions to enjoy the sweets and to fill the jar with spare coins to donate to a charity after Christmas. Saturday 10th December saw 28 willing volunteers meet at Fleet Methodist |Church to attach the labels to the Angels for their public debut the following Saturday. Sound System

Recordings continued to be made of services and copied to CDs for use of members of the congregation. Discs containing recordings of services over 12 months old were destroyed and disposed of in compliance with copyright requirements. Approximately eleven months’ recordings have been retained.

Cleaning

Hall and Room Bookings.

Bookings overall are slightly lower than in the previous year. They still provide a significant income stream but there are some notable gaps in the bookings calendar. We still have no takers for Tuesday morning or Thursday afternoon in the Hall. Also, the number of parties is down on previous years. NCT bookings fell off during the second half of the year because they were unable to find local teachers and when they did find teachers they required the use of the Hall rather than the Meeting Room, which was often not available at the time they required.

Tuesday and Wednesday evenings however continue to be very busy with Rainbows and Brownies followed by two large groups – in the Hall and Sanctuary. I generally restrict use of the Meeting Room at this time to avoid problems in the car park.

We have acquired a new group, Toddler Sign and Sign, which uses the Small Meeting Room on Tuesday mornings.

The income from Hall and Room lettings is anticipated to be £21,325 when all monies have been collected.

The Methodist church hosted the Christian Aid service and Katie Roberts gave a very interesting address. The grand total for all the collections and sales in Fleet during the week was £9,324.

The annual Carol Concert in December was held at St Philip & St James Church. It raised £865 and we are very grateful to Fleet Choral Society for their continuing support. It is much appreciated.

We cater for 0-5 year olds and so children outgrow the group fairly quickly and we are always encouraging new parents to help facilitate sessions. We currently have a group of 5 regular parent helpers to help set up and pack away, we actively encourage parents to come early and help set up even if they are not officially a 'helper'. We are very lucky to have a retired volunteer who joins us each week to assist in the kitchen as well as meet and greet parents and play with the children.

What days do we run?

Fridays throughout the year closing only on bank holidays and when we do not have enough parent volunteers to run the session.

Attendance

The attendance numbers have been steadily increasing throughout 2016, we are now currently at an average of around 20 families.

In order to ensure we are able to cover our costs of each session we changed our entrance fee to a flat rate of £2 per family.

Footsteps

(previously Little Fishes and Loaves & Fishes)

At the start of 2016, Little Fishes and Loaves and Fishes were still meeting separately, the latter using ROOTS as a basis for the sessions.

Over the course of the year, it became clear the Little Fishes was not viable as a separate group, as we were regularly having more adults than children attending. Each session still required planning and preparation even if no children turned up on the Sunday and for the Spring Term, we averaged 1.5 children each week. At the same time, Loaves and Fishes were finding that their older members wanted more support in their exploration of the topics outlined in ROOTS.

On suggestion from the members of Loaves and Fishes, instead of following ROOTS through the Summer and Autumn terms, a different activity was undertaken, exploring the people from the Old Testament.

Using the stories in the Lion Storyteller Bible by Bob Hartman, the young people designed and produced a series of posters each week concentrating on one character. They listened carefully to the story and wrote down or drew pictures of the significant parts then set about producing a poster to capture the different aspects. Members of Little Fishes joined in enthusiastically and from the success of these sessions, the decision was taken to create a new group to encompass both the existing Little Fishes and Loaves and Fishes. The new group, named Footsteps, will split into different activities during a Sunday morning but the overall theme and start and end of the sessions will be joint. The group will use the material in ROOTS as a basis for the sessions each week. It is hoped that this format will better suit the needs of the young people from the youngest to the oldest.

We are very different people, we come from many different backgrounds but we have one thing in common, we are on the journey of Christian Faith. As we read the Bible and discuss what it really means, each one takes away a personal concept which helps to feed, inspire and encourage.

During the year we spent many weeks exploring the Lord's Prayer. It was generally agreed that it could become so familiar that the prayer loses its impact and potency. Therefore after each session the group said the prayer together both slowly and thoughtfully. We also studied portions both from the Old and New Testament as well as the lives of various Women in the Bible.

We still from time to time have a DIY Morning, when members bring something to share with the group.

One week a member brought **The Feedback Game**.

70 cards portray human strengths such as respectful, good tempered, discerning, diligent, responsible, etc.

Each player receives three cards.

Turns are taken to take a new card. The player decides whether to keep this card and discard one from the hand.

Any player can choose to donate a card to another player instead of discarding it but they must explain why they think the other player deserves the card.

At the end each player announces which three attributes they have chosen to describe themselves and explain why. It needed courage and honesty but was a soul searching experience shared with friends.
