Training and development

- Attend the Ministers Spring school in May
- Attend the day ministers conference in September
- Contributor for 'Daily Devotions' for the wider URC
- Write hymns for particular services and occasions
- Written liturgies for specific occasions (on request)
- Attended the Brexit worship and developed resources.
- Sabbatical Seeking shalom- led minister's workshops on my theme.
- Written reflections and study material for small groups.

Most importantly, MASA and LMMR addresses three questions:

What does the church need?

In 2018, the Elders will be undertaking LMMR (Local Ministry and Mission Review), where with the guidance of an appraisal partner, they will take stock at where they are after five years of ministry with myself as their minister. Are the priorities that were identified five years ago, still the same or have they changed?

My training needs?

Each year, I take a theme for my development, and over the following months write, pray and develop resources for churches to use. In view of my eye condition, this year I am looking at *Embodied Theology*, exploring God dwelling in the body, in the disabled body, blindness, diseased, mental health, and disfigured body due to surgery. I continue to go for Spiritual accompaniment every 6-8 weeks.

• What are 'my' needs?

In recent months, I have identified three areas, and have been addressing these.

Ministry needs to be open and transparent, however even though I use my diary constantly, (for those who know me, I cannot think unless I see my days in front of me!), there is always a part of ministry that remains invisible, unexpected and therefore unaccountable. I go where God sends me, whether it be through a conversation or a nudge.

I hope for the day when everyone can speak again of God without embarrassment.

Paul Tillich (1886-1965)

In February 2018, I will have celebrated my fifth 'anniversary' as your minister at Fleet United Reformed Church. In recognition of this, I have just completed my Ministerial review, (MASA), which is quite a long process and includes identifying roles with the two churches of Fleet and Beacon Hill, and other responsibilities within the wider URC and beyond. This is issued as an appendix to this report.

It is good to stop and reflect where we have been, where we are now, and look ahead to the future, for we must never stand still; Martin Luther's **Semper Reformanda**, (the church reformed, always reforming) also applies to us as 21st century Christians.

Worship.

I continue to lead worship twice a month on Sunday mornings, (1st and 3rd) and conduct the monthly evening service. As 2017 commenced we received six people into membership.

Morning service

The morning services have been a little different this year, as the first Sunday in the month we have been exploring the 10 Holy Habits for Discipleship. Why was this done in a service? One reason that the Elders and myself considered is that we have a 'captive audience'.

Together with 'special services', for example Baptisms, Parade services, celebrating Martin Luther's 500th anniversary and celebrating Constance Coltman's 100th anniversary of her ordination, the Sunday mornings have been full. We continue to celebrate communion on the third Sundays.

Evening service

The theme for the evening services during 2017 have been the 'I am' sayings in John's Gospel

• I am the Bread of Life (John 6:35)

- I am the Light of the world (John 8:12)
- I am the Gate (John 10:9)
- I am the Good Shepherd (John 10:11)
- I am the Resurrection and the Life (John 11:25)
- I am the Way, the Truth and the Life (John 14:6)
- I am the true Vine (John 15:1)

Although small in numbers, the services are quiet and reflective, and it has an ecumencial feel, with regular Methodists and Anglicans coming to worship with us.

Discipleship

Paul Tillich believed discipleship was paramount for Gods people to be effective disciples and communicators,. They could then feel confident to talk about their faith to other people. In 2017, I have explored this in a variety of ways.

Holy Habits

This year, we have explored the 10 Holy Habits, as discussed in Andrew Roberts Book 'Holy Habits.'.

- 1. Biblical teaching,
- 2. Fellowship
- 3. Breaking of bread
- 4. Prayer
- 5. Giving
- 6. Service
- 7. Eating together
- 8. Gladness and generosity
- 9. Worship
- 10 Making new disciples (still to do)

It would be fair to say that this is a new concept of learning about discipleship, as many people cannot attend a regular disciple session. However equipping Gods people to be good disciples is important to enable our faith to grow. Next year there will be new opportunities to learn more about growing and nurturing our faith, through the URC *Walking the Way*.

Martin Luther

In October, I held three sessions about Martin Luther 500th anniversary, which included watching a film, a Sunday worship service that reflected on

those who feel oppressed by society, and dare I say the structure and power of the church?

As Tillich as my backdrop, I offer to you the following areas, reflecting on my ministry, including my roles, responsibilities, and contributions to the wider Church. You already know what I do at Fleet URC, so I have not included them again.

I feel loathed just to produce a list of my roles and responsibilities, but it is a tool to answer the three major questions below.

APPENDIX

Ministers Accompanied Self- Appraisal (MASA)

Every five years ministers are strongly encouraged to undergo MASA. It is part of a 'joint' appraisal, with the church also looking at their needs and priorities. For Fleet URC and Beacon Hill URC, this will to be done in 2018 however, I have nearly completed my appraisal.

It is an in depth, large, confidential document, and I have an experienced person in the Synod who I meet and discuss the content. However after five years of being your minister, I feel the summary below may give an indication to the demands that Ministry provides me in the pastorate of Fleet and Beacon Hill Hindhead, and the demands of the wider Church. Some of my roles will change from year to year, however I have a responsibility and a calling to undertake roles within the Synod.

At the beginning of my AGM report, I quoted Paul Tillich, a Lutheran Protestant Theologian who has been uppermost in my mind. As I have reflected on the effect my ministry has upon Gods people, and my speaking about the Gospel to which we all adhere, Tillich was interested that the God whom Christians worship, should be accessible to all people, and he wrote a book called *Courage to be,* which is still a core book to read in ministerial training. He discusses that God is not so much a presence, but God is manifested in the structure of beings, that is the *Ground of our Being.* Therefore we should be able more easily about a God who dwells within us, as well as a God who creates and heals to speak about.

Why am I referring to Tillich?

Recently, I re-read the book again in preparation for my MASA review. Even though Theological thinking has progressed, Tillich's book was ground breaking as it led people to discuss God. Surely that is what the Gospel is all about, to engage in conversation, to proclaim the good news, and liberate

his Theology, and a 'Walk with Martin Luther' evening. This hopefully was able to answer some questions about the Reformation and also the United Reformed Church, its history and heritage. Learning about the challenges and opportunities he made for himself, which still affect us today in the 21st century, all add to assist our understand of discipleship. These three events seemed to be well attended by church members, and also by people from the wider churches in Fleet.

Bible study

This is held every month usually on the second Monday of the month at Church, where I consider the Lectionary readings for the following week.

Mission

Proclaiming Gods Love to all people should be the basis of why we serve God and Gods people, regardless of denomination, age, gender and abilities. If we love and serve God, we must have some responsibilities and include Mission in our discipleship.

Coffee morning

I am usually found most Thursday mornings at the Coffee morning at Fleet URC. Here is a good way to catch up with the community. People come from Fleet, Church Crookham and beyond. The Methodist church, the Baptist church and the Fleet Lions are all regulars together with some friendship groups who meet monthly.

Palani mission

Our partnership with South India has deepened and is a real blessing for the church to recognize its brothers and sisters in Christ, in another continent and different culture. I am hoping to visit Palani Mission in August 2018.

Invisible ministry

For ministers, the unexpected frequently comes along, through phone calls, casual conversations or individuals wishing to see me. This is called 'invisible' ministry, as you cannot plan it, it just happens. One area is my involvement in Funerals. I have conducted nine funerals in 2017. Many have had no connection with the church and have found me through other funerals I have conducted. My involvement in funerals is part of the Mission I do on behalf of the church. The Remembrance and Memorial service held in October is always well attended, and invitations are sent to all the families

(40 in total), that I have been involved with relating to their family /friends' funeral.

Ecumenism

Thy Kingdom come

During 2017, Fleet URC hosted 'Thy Kingdom come', an ecumenical venture supported by Churches Together. The church was available every day with creative Prayer stations and themes for daily prayer. Members of surrounding churches attended, as well as some users of our premises. I co- ordinated the event.

Churches Together

During 2017 I attended the Clergy Lunches on a fairly regular basis. Sometimes I had other commitments which prevented me attending .. Next year, we will be meeting at 8.30 in the morning, so the day is not interrupted . The focus will be on reconnecting again with established clergy in Fleet and Church Crookham and developing relationships with newer clergy recently moved to the area.

Anna Chaplaincy

I am the chair of Anna Chaplaincy which supports the spiritual needs of older people in homes and those living with dementia in Fleet and Church Crookham. We are part of a larger Anna Chaplaincy network that is supported by Bible Reading Fellowship. My role includes supporting the Anna Chaplain Co-ordinator, chairing meetings with the ecumenical steering group, including Nigel Poole who represents the NHS, and Rev Haydon Wilcox.

Communion at Kings place

I am part of a small Clergy team that conducts communion services at Kings Place. I usually visit every couple of months, where we listen to music, pray, have a short reflection and then have communion in the style of our reformed tradition. This has been well received. I have also given them some of my reflection booklets that have been used as basis for their house groups.

Prayer

As well as my private prayer time, I meet with God every month for prayer at the church. I pray for our congregation at Fleet URC, the community and those situations which I know are challenging people's faith, for example

an-style Christmas decorations that we had made and two rainbows wore ta'ovalas (a traditional Tongan dress (a mat wrapped around the waist and decorated with leaves, seeds and shells).

At the end of this year Rabbit (Collette) had a baby so she has left and our unit helper* Woodpecker (Alison) left when her daughter moved to brownies.

*Fortunately another rainbow mum has become a Unit Helper (Bumble Bee) but we do still need an assistant leader.

8th Fleet Brownies

Once again 8th Fleet Brownies have had a busy year. They have worked on many Brownie badges relevant to the length of time they have been at Brownies e.g. Brownie Adventure, Brownie Adventure On, More Adventure and Brownies Go For It. They have worked on a variety of interest badges: - Book lover, Craft, Hostess, Disability Awareness, World Culture and Out and About. They are in the proves of working towards Culture and Environment badges. Learning about the area in which they live and recycling.

Highlights for the year include planting Summer flowers in pots at Fleet Hospital and replacing them in the autumn.

Attending and taking part in Church Parades Assisting with the making of the Christingles for the service. In the Autumn they once again ran a successful Tombola stall at the Autumn Craft Fair and raised £180 to donate toward local charities e.g. Parity.

The summer term was spent outside. The girls took part in a bat walk around Fleet pond. Orienteering at Oakley Park, Geo cashing which they enjoyed so much they asked to do it again.

Our assistant leader Ladybird (Rachael) left us but luckily we were joined by Rabbit (Collette).

In the summer term we worked on the Quacktastic Challenge badge. The girls discovered how eggs from different birds differ in size and colour. At the meeting we cooked and tasted ducks, quails and hens eggs. We talked about the importance if leaving nests undisturbed. We learnt how to separate egg whites from the yolks and we made meringues. We visited Jakes Animal Park at Trilakes. We fed the goats, alpacas and sheep. Unfortunately the rain poured down so we ended up wetter than the ducks.

Our other activities in the summer term included a hula hooping session, a scavenger hunt in the park, an evening where we learnt about water safety and had fun playing watery games, and a Princess meeting.

The Rainy Day Challenge badge kept us busy over several meetings during the autumn term. We carried out some rainbow science experiments: we made a rain cloud in a cup; made erupting rainbows and watched what happens when coloured sweets are arranged in milk. We made rainshakers. We painted ceramic wellie boots and planted violets in them. We also planted violets in pots and gave them away to local residents as 'a random act of kindness'.

Our younger leader Hedgehog went to visit Sri Lanka with Ocean Stars Trust (a link between Calthorpe Park School and schools in the Batticaloa area has been established). Hedgehog told us about the project and we found out about Sri Lanka.

For harvest we cut out leaves and wrote on the ways that we can create a better world. We hung them in the church to decorate it for the Harvest Service.

Also this term we found out about the mid-autumn Vietnamese festival of Thung Thu. We played a game that Vietnam children play and we tried some sweet versions of mooncakes.

In November we held a pyjama party during our meeting to celebrate 30 years of Rainbows! The girls found out about rainbows in 1987, made 30th birthday cards to send to other rainbows and ate some birthday cake.

At Christmas we attended the gift service at the United Reformed Church. We had decorated the church windows with shiny stars that we had cut out. We took part in a Girlguiding carol service at The Church on the Heath where we told the congregation about Christmas in Tonga. We showed some Tong-

illness or bereavement . Although we are small in numbers, we faithfully gather, and do so on behalf of the church ,in the presence of God. During pastoral visits, which I mainly do on Thursday, and home communions, prayer is the focus of my visit.

Final Thoughts

As we enter another year, we are on the cusp of great possibilities, challenge and nurture. I do not know what global events will face us in 2018, I do not know what events will happen in the lives of the congregation at Fleet URC.

However, this I do know:-

The God who guided Moses to land of plenty;

The God who walked with the prophets;

The God who came down to earth to dwell as an infant and lived a life in the man we call Jesus

The God who conquered death, and brought new life and new starts to all people;

is the God who continues to walk with us on the pilgrim road.

May God, who is our Creator, Redeemer and Sustainer journey with us, as we remember the past, encounter him in the present, and with faith, face the future.

In our first term we worked on the Buddy Bag Challenge badge. The Buddy Bag Foundation was set up after seeing a scheme in Australia where children who need to go into emergency accommodation in a hurry are given a backpack with essential items as well as cuddly toys and books. Our rainbows found out about it and what goes into the backpack. We enjoyed some Australian themed activities. The girls raised money for the Foundation by doing some jobs at home.

We made Thinking Day cards and sent them to rainbows in another unit. World Thinking Day is on 22nd February and that was the birthday of The Founder of Scouting Lord Robert Baden-Powell and his wife Lady Olave Baden Powell who was Chief Guide from 1918 until 1977.

4th Fleet (United Reformed Church) Brownies

We started 2017 by undertaking our 'Water Safety' badge. The girls learned what the different kinds of flags at beaches mean, and created leaflets to explain to children how to stay safe when by water.

We also went out for a winter night walk around Fleet Pond. Everyone put on hats and scarves and brought a torch. It was freezing but great fun!

In February we celebrated Thinking Day with 1st Fleet West Rainbows, and learned about Guiding in other countries before saying our Promise by candle light.

Throughout the year, some of our older girls planned and lead meetings as part of their 'Brownie Adventure'. We had marvellous meetings such as Murder Mystery, Animals, and Harry Potter.

The girls had also been undertaking their 'World Cultures' badge, and by March we were decorating Eggs using techniques from other countries.

After Easter we began the 'Rustle, Bustle and Squeak' challenge badges, which are created by South West Region and look at different kinds of Wildlife. We made natural houses for insects and enjoyed bird watching in the fields behind Fleet Pond.

We spent some time looking at the Brownie Promise and the girls asked if they could make gifts for the congregation as part of their 'Community' segment. They spent a whole evening creating some lovely keyrings and gave these ou at the next service we attended.

In June we held a sleepover for some of our younger Brownies, and the theme was 'The World of Disney'. We had food from other countries and the girls hadto work out where the stories behind Disney films originated from.

To finish the summer term we had a BBQ and water games. The girls also got to mix their own 'Mocktail' which they really enjoyed. 7

In August we went on our Brownie Holiday! We had 3 nights away Walton Firs Activity Site. The theme was 'I'm a Brownie... Get me out of here!', and we pushed the girls to their limits by sending them down into the dark caves, making them cross a mud assault course, and by cleaning out the 'dunnies'. A wonderful time was had by all and many badges were earned.

When we returned from the Summer holidays we started our 'Circus Performer badge'. The first meeting on this theme was to make juggling balls and to try plate spinning and diabolo tricks.

I look forward to continuing as an elder with the church and know you will support my successor in the continued work of Fleet URC.

Property

Grounds

- a) Contractors continue to attend to the grounds, taking care of the grass cutting and hedge trimming. They also deal with litter and any other work as requested.
- b) Thanks to Brian Coney who continues to maintain the two flower beds at the front of the church.
- c) Flood light that was installed to light car park has been very effective.
- d) The edge of the bricked walkway adjoining the car park surface at the entrance to the church was restructured. The edge now consists of a uniform row of bricks set at an angle. Access is now easier for using walking aids, wheelchairs etc and for those with restricted mobility and vision.

Fire Alarm and Emergency Lights

Fire alarm system and extinguishers all tested and serviced by Hampshire Fire Services as per the contract. Powder extinguisher in Kitchen replaced by CO2 and Foam extinguishers as current recommendations. System tested on a routine basis between formal services.

Electrical System

a) New ceiling lights fitted to the ladies and gent's toilets.

Heating Systems

- a) Sanctuary heating system serviced.
- b) Hall and meeting rooms heating system had new boiler installed due to corrosion of the heat exchanger of the previous boiler. A new manifold with control valves was installed on the heating water supply to the radiators (except main hall). Also fitted was a magnetic filter on the main water supply pipe and a filter with magnetic core was fitted to the general circulating system.
- c) The new boiler has a 10-year guarantee.
- d) Due to the upgrading of regulations regarding who can work on gas services, domestic or industrial and based on the output capacity of the supply gas meter, it was necessary to employ a plumber with compatible qualifications. Because there at two boilers on the property, the single supply gas meter required falls into the higher or industrial category. Previous plumber had let his industrial certification lapse as his business is predominantly in the domestic sector.
- e) There have been issues with sediment build up in the filter on the mixing valve on the supply to the new manifold. However, with regular cleaning this build-up has reduced considerably.
- f) At the time of writing we await a quotation to have independent room thermostats fitted to individual spaces and respective solenoid control valves fitted on the respective manifold control valves. A full flushing of the heating system will be considered at that time.

Kitchen

a) The "PROTON" industrial dishwasher water supply softener charged on a routine basis.

Hall and Meeting Room Blinds

Due to wear, new clutches, end assemblies and pull cords have been fitted to all the blinds in the hall, meeting rooms and office. . All the pull cards have been re-fitted in line with current regulations. The girls all planted some petunias in May to take home, and we discussed how to care for them. They did very well and we still had some flowering in October!

In June we had a sleepover with the theme 'Teddybears' Picnic'. The girls all brought a nice bear in their luggage and we took them to the park for a picnic tea. The girls went to bed nicely and did a lovely job of making their beds in the morning.

We finished off the summer term with a fun meeting filled with water games. It was a very hot day so the girls enjoyed wearing their shorts and T-shirts and getting wet!

In September we started a new badge called 'Roundabout the World'. This is one of the core Rainbow badges and it teaches girls about energy and recycling. We started by learning about fossil fuels.

We celebrated 30 years of Rainbows! The section first started in 1987 and we had a fun meeting where the girls got to learn about what the uniform used to be, who the mascot was, and we even got to eat some birthday cake.

By October the girls had moved on to renewable energy sources, and had a science-filled meeting where they made water wheels and played with some solar lighting. One evening all the girls brought a bag of rubbish along with them, and they enjoyed separating it into the different types of recyclables. We joined the Fleet Remembrance Parade in November, and one of our Rainbows was chosen to lay the wreath for Girlguiding Fleet, alongside one of our Brownies and a Guide from another unit. She did an excellent job.

Our second sleepover of the year was a joint one with 4th Fleet Brownies, and the theme was 'Under the Sea'. The girls enjoyed creating their own sea creatures using Fimo and putting it in the oven to bake.

We finished the term with the Fleet District Carol service. The theme was 'Colours of Christmas', and we represented red. We put on a play about a Robin who lived by a Postbox.

2017 saw us enrol 11 new girls into 1st Fleet West Rainbows, and welcome a new helper called 'Squirrel' who is volunteering as part of her Duke of Edinburgh award. The girls enjoyed attending three church services at the URC, and especially loved donating food and gifts at Harvest.

Easter services went very well with a Sunrise service held at 6am on Tweseldown and led by the Parish of Fleet

There are some encouraging figures from Hart Foodbank for the year to March 2017: Over 940 three day emergency food supplies were provided to local people in crisis

Over the year, local people have donated 15 tonnes of food to this cause and over 90 people volunteered. Local schools, businesses and faith groups have supplied vital support to this cause enabling us to give three days' nutritionally balanced foods and support to people in crisis.

Our Church, led by Ruth, hosted "Thy Kingdom Come" prayer initiative. This was carried over the 5 days for personal prayer with 5 stations arranged to cover Forgiveness, Persecuted Christian, The Light of Christ, The Holy Spirit and Thy Kingdom come. Each day our Church was open from 10am – 2pm with a led prayer at noon.

Saturday the Church was also open for reflection and prayer from 6pm to midnight.

On Sunday 19th November at St Philip & James, Fleet Angels are celebrated their 10th Anniversary this year.

During the last 4 years CAP, Debt Management Centre in Fleet has been approached for help by 28 local people. Unfortunately the CAP team stood down at the end of 2017. This project has now closed

Christian Aid 2017

The house-to-house collection in May raised £675 and our thanks as ever to our collectors. A new venture this year was a collection at the railway station, on the five weekdays, and this resulted in £300. The Cake & Plant Sale in May was held in the Parish Hall at All Saints Church and raised £622. Christ Church, Gally Hill Road, hosted the Christian Aid service but dwindling numbers have thrown the future of this service into doubt. Footsteps

For first part of the year, we continued to use ROOTS as the framework of our Sunday sessions for which we typically have between 6 and 10 children attending. Sometimes we carried out activities as one large group or, depending on the topic and the number and age range of those children and young people attending, we had parts of the session where we had two different activities exploring the theme. We always try to start and end the session as whole group.

Through the year, Footsteps has done lots of thinking, praying, sharing, planting, cooking and, of course, making! Some highlights included: paper helicopters showing God's blessings falling down on us, discussing reconciliation and forgiveness, painting with blowing bubbles, making braille letters with beads and modelling clay, Palm Sunday pipecleaner figures, creating Easter gardens with clay caves plus the egg hunt around the church, marshmallow bridges representing Jesus bridging the gap between us and God, bird feeders to reflect God's love for all creatures, creating a "place of rest" under the tables with cushions and lights, planting rocket seeds to distribute to the congregation...

During 2017, Footsteps have also co-ordinated the decoration of the church windows for Easter, Harvest and Advent with able assistance from the congregation as well as the Brownie and Rainbow packs. "He is Risen" signs were distributed, coloured in and decorated for Easter Sunday and put up on the windows with the aforementioned pipe cleaner figures; leaf shapes declaring those things for which we are thankful were displayed for Harvest and the stars theme for the Advent period was reflected on the windows and interior glass doors of the church.

In March, we presented the Old Testament characters that were created last year to the congregation. The posters have since been made available as a resource to Synod.

Returning after the summer holidays, Footsteps took a different approach where we spent a few sessions reviewing how the group was working and what the children and young people thought could be improved. As part of this, we looked at "For Every Child", a book which presents the statements of the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child in a child friendly format, and the URC Charter for Children in the Church which sets out the URC's commitments with regards to children and young people. We found that the language for the charter was not easily accessible for the children (or the

Monday Morning House Group - Bible Study

In 2017 the House Group Bible studies have included some of Jesus Parables, Paul's Journeys, the Psalms and the Gospel of Mark. We mostly follow study books written by specialised authors (Cover to Cover Series for example). Each topic usually extends over six or seven sessions.

The morning is divided into two halves – the first half commences with prayers led by different members of the group, followed by our study time also led by various members. We usually conclude with Prayers of Intercession for those who are known to the group who are unwell or facing difficult problems. National and International problems are also remembered.

The group learnt about 'Open the Book' project from one of the members who is part of the local team. This initiative offers primary school children an opportunity to hear the major stories in the Bible, from a team of Christians drawn from local churches, who present the stories during assemblies/acts of Collective Worship. Started in Bedford in 1999 it is now accepted in over 2000 schools countrywide.

Do-it-yourself mornings can be fun times as each one (usually everyone!) brings along something to share (not often food but sometimes!). One of our D.I.Y. mornings took place at "The Elvetham" to celebrate a member's 90th birthday. This provoked questions from the Hotel staff, which enabled us to explain what a Bible Study/House Group is all about. The Group were well looked after and enjoyed homemade shortbreads cooked the morning of our visit.

The second half of the morning is a time for tea, coffee, hot or cold water (members preference) and biscuits. This is a much more relaxed time when we share things that have happened during the week. Perhaps visits members have made to London for a Show, the Christmas Tree Festival at St Philip & St. James, etc. Often there are a few funny stories.

We value the part each member plays. We miss Sheila Durbin and her input into the Group and hope she will soon be well enough to join us again. We also miss Peggy Batchelor who like Sheila has been a member almost from the start of the Group Most weeks there are an average of nine / ten people unless sickness, holidays or visiting families who are poorly prevents some from coming. This adds up to somewhere near 90% each week.

Paddington Bear visited the group, greeting each member as they arrived and was photographed with the group during the session.

- 8. All people, young and old, can discover and develop their skills and talents at church.
- 9. At church, people of all ages, young and old, should do as many things together as they can.
- 10. All people, young and old, can talk directly to God through prayer.

In Footsteps we have agreed to:

- Listen to each other
- Behave well
- Respect each other
- Share ideas
- Take part and join in
- Use technology appropriately
