FROM THE MANSE



Dear Friends

For those of you who have been counting, there were at least 140 hours of live coverage of World Cup football by the time the Final was over. That does not include the extended time given over to pre-match commentary and expert analysis after each game. If you take all that, plus the recorded highlights, you get almost double that time. Some people just cannot get enough of the so-called Beautiful Game.

When I served URC churches in Liverpool, the two famous teams of Liverpool and Everton dominated conversations. I am not an ardent supporter of

football (I much prefer Rugby League or Union), but I did recognise that football is a passion in Liverpool. I can remember when in 2005 Liverpool won the European Cup for the fourth time, which entitled the Club to keep the magnificent trophy, I watched with thousands of other people as Liverpool came to a standstill, cheering and waving to the talented men who were on an open-topped bus. I was then a passionate football fan like everyone else!

My World Cup viewing was limited to the England games (yes, we did cancel a Beacon Hill Elders' meeting to watch it!). I became an 'expert', giving advice when goals are missed, and joining the legion of armchair critics who just so happen to know exactly which team should be picked and how the game should be played!

But let us not write off the World Cup altogether, even if you are not a football fan. It is true to say that the impact of the World Cup, or any other great world sporting event for that matter, goes beyond what happens for the 90 minutes inside the football stadium or, say, the various events of an Olympic Games, cricket tournament, or Wimbledon.

Sport is more than a game, and a more recent phenomenon has been the social impact that global sport has had on people's lives, raising issues surrounding HIV/Aids and poverty. Football has been a bridge that has enabled people from all walks of life to take part, for it breaks all social and cultural boundaries.

Remember David Beckham kicking a football with children and young people in Soweto, or the football match on Christmas Day 1914? The latter is often celebrated as a symbolic moment of peace in an otherwise devastatingly violent war. We may like to believe that, just for one day, all across the Front, men from both sides emerged from the trenches and met in No Man's Land to exchange gifts and play football.

There will be many questions raised about the rights and wrongs of the World Cup, not least the enormous cost of hosting it and the way host venues are sometimes chosen. There are also dangers when misguided patriotism from so-called supporters has a very negative impact which can escalate into violence, and we know that there has been a real threat of that happening.

Sport can bring out the worst in people, but it can also bring out the best and be used for a greater common good at local, national and international level. Not least, it is great to see people of different nations coming together, especially when football is played in the most difficult of circumstances and situations. When it does the latter, then somehow I think God will approve.

May we offer to God the best of our common humanity when opportunity arises, even if it is in an arena of fair competition. It is a goal worth aiming for. Every blessing,

Arriving at the camp, we were warmly welcomed into a calm environment where everyone was settling in while socialising or putting up their tents. On the Friday we arrived it was mainly an informative afternoon for both new arrivals and regular attenders, where everyone's concerns and queries were cleared up.



The next day and a half began with breakfast at 8:15 am, which was shortly followed by Worship. Worship was a period of time where we all sang songs and praises and introduced our topic—Jesus is the Way, the Truth and the Life. There were 'RE:Connect' sessions which always followed. This was

where we looked deeper into the topic with a choice of four groups: think it, do it, share it and make it. We had the option to choose any group for the three sessions, and you could either stick to your current group or change to another group each time. Each group was different, which made sure everyone was comfortable and happy in what they were doing. As an example, for the topic 'The Way' in the 'think it' group, they had a meditation session where they reflected on the story of the Road to Emmaus, and in the 'make it' group they designed maps and compasses.

The weekend also consisted of an array of amazing activities, from a relaxing woodland walk to an adrenaline-pumping, mega climbing tower! On our programme (which was located on our personalised lanyards) it was known as 'Get Active'. These sessions were extremely fun and they gave us an opportunity to make new friends!

Throughout the weekend we were also generously treated with a treasure hunt, a night hike (optional), and a BBQ dinner!

After our exhausting, but fun-filled day, we had a two-hour break where we could just generally chill until it was 11:30 pm, lights out. You could either enjoy a mug of hot chocolate by the campfire, play board games, or just hang around in your tent!

Overall, the camp was outstanding, and we are definitely looking forward to the next one!

THINK: RECYCLE

We are very lucky in Fleet and the surrounding areas, that we live in a beautiful part of the world, with woodland, the Basingstoke Canal, Fleet Pond and countryside on our doorstep... and yet we are also within easy reach of the coast and London. No wonder Hart often tops the polls of the best places to live.

However Hampshire certainly 'could do better' when it comes to recycling. We come 205th out of 350 in the recycling league tables, with only 41.6% of household waste being sent for reuse, recycling or composting. The East Riding of Yorkshire tops the table with 65.4%, whilst the London Borough of Newham languishes at the bottom of the table with an appalling 14.1%.

Whilst my recent articles have contained tips for reducing waste, I would now like to tell you about a new opportunity for recycling at Fleet URC that comes about through my connection to South Farnborough Infant School (SFIS), where I am a part-time teacher. SFIS is an Eco School which bases its entire curriculum on the Seven Principles of Harmony (Geometry, Interdependence, Circles and Cycles, Diversity, Healthy and Happy, Beauty and Oneness) and the children are very aware of nature, the world around them and their place in the world. Amongst many eco-measures and

recycling opportunities, they have become Bic Community Champions and are collecting used writing implements for recycling. The school also receives £0.01 per writing instrument that is recycled.

The scheme accepts any pen, any highlighter, any correction fluid pot, any marker, any felt tip, any mechanical pencil or eraser pen, any fountain pen or ink cartridge, regardless of their composition. They do not accept glue sticks, erasers, rulers, pencils or sharp objects, eg scissors. Once collected, the writing



instruments are separated by material composition, cleaned and melted into hard plastic that can be remoulded to make new recycled products.

Look out for a collection box at church soon... all your writing implements will be gratefully received!

IMOGEN'S BOOK





PRAYER FOR THE MONTH

As I write this magazine article a hose pipe ban has been implemented in the north of England due to the UK having the hottest summer in 40 years. I offer this reflection and prayer as we wait for the rains to come. Some of you may remember the event.

No one likes rain during their summer holidays, but in August 1952 torrential rain was the experience of people in Lynmouth, a very picturesque small holiday resort on the north coast of Devon.

On 15th August it had rained very heavily for hour after hour. The soil of the huge area of the moor called Exmoor could soak up only so much water—the rest had to flow downhill. Although vast amounts of water had already fallen, at about 8.30 in the evening there was a cloudburst. Down came more torrential rain.

Twenty-three centimetres (9 inches) of rain fell in 24 hours, whereas the area normally received about 83 centimetres (33 inches) in a whole year! And so the River Lynn that, in a normal summertime, flowed from the moor over rocks and big boulders, now became a killer. Suddenly giant waves of water swept off the moor and picked up huge boulders and rocks as though they were tiny



pebbles. The water and boulders and soil swept through the village of Lynmouth, destroying 28 bridges as though they were twigs. As electricity had been cut off, the people could not even see the tragedy that was upon them. Many buildings were destroyed or badly damaged. More importantly, 31 people were killed, and some of the bodies were never recovered. They were either lost under thick mud, or were washed out to sea.

In the daylight of the morning of 16th August, the emergency services discovered how bad the tragedy was. Lynmouth was a severe 'natural disaster' in a country that does not normally have such experiences.

Documentary TV programmes on natural disasters often include scenes of Lynmouth. Camera shots of the great size of the boulders of rock, and the distance they were moved by the onrush of water, illustrate how powerful and destructive water can be.

In a country that is blessed with an abundance of water, perhaps we don't fully appreciate how vital water is for all life. Water is used as a sign in Baptism— a symbol of dying to selfishness and sin, and living the new life that Jesus brings.

When Jesus was baptised in the River Jordan, he was placing himself beside all who had sinned and needed to make a new start and live in a better way. At that time, Abba, you were heard to say that Jesus was your well-loved Son, and the Holy Spirit rested upon him.

Fill us with your Spirit, that we may grow in the realisation and faith that we, too, are your sons and daughters whom you love greatly.

CHURCHES TOGETHER IN FLEET AND CROOKHAM (CTFC)

As you will probably remember, over the last six months Churches Together has rested in what was described as a fallow period, to allow us to recover and regain energy. During this time the ministers have met together for fellowship, prayer, and a period of reflection.

On Thursday 12th July there was a meeting held at LivingStones where the ministers explained the new aims that had come from these fruitful meetings. To adopt these aims would require a change to the constitution, which requires 75% of member churches to agree to the proposals.

The new aims must be brought to our Church Meeting for discussion, and hopefully your approval, prior to my attendance at the Churches Together AGM in September.

For your information, here are the current aims as detailed in our Constitution:

- to enable churches, as pilgrims together, to explore the Christian faith together, to develop mutual relationships, to seek a common mind, and to make decisions together;
- to encourage churches to worship, pray and reflect together on the nature and purpose of the church in the light of its mission—each church sharing with others the treasures of its traditions:
- to enable churches to live and share the Gospel, to evangelise and serve together, and to take further steps towards fuller unity;
- to enable churches to respond to the needs of society and to witness to the Gospel together.

The new aims, as discussed at the meeting:

- to enable the member churches, as pilgrims together, to explore the Christian faith together, to develop mutual relationships, to find common ground, and to work together to build God's Kingdom;
- to enable and encourage the member churches to worship and pray together:
- to enable the member churches to live and share the Gospel, to evangelize together and to take further steps towards fuller unity;
- to enable the member churches to respond to the needs of society and to witness to the Gospel together;
- to enable the member churches to reflect together on the nature and purpose of the church in the light of its mission—each church sharing with others the treasures of its tradition.

I invite you to reflect and ask for guidance in your prayers on this matter. I hope you will let me know your thoughts.
