


A poem a day through Advent.

Unlike Lent, Advent is celebrated when the year is becoming darker and colder, moving into the death and dormancy of winter. Before we can greet the coming of the light we need to engage with some themes that are challenging and occasionally fearful. Like the magi who travelled a long distance to search out and adore the infant Jesus, and who took some wrong turnings on the way, we too have a journey to undertake.

2. The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe, C S Lewis

During Advent we shall be lighting a candle on the Advent wreath each week. We shall be using words from The Lion, the Witch and the Wardrobe by C S Lewis, alongside familiar Scripture readings.

If you have not read this children's classic, or it was a long time ago, then please consider reading it during the Advent season.





HOW TO HAVE A 'GREEN' CHRISTMAS

There are so many everyday ways that we can be 'green', but at special times, like Christmas, we can be lured into buving more than we need, or making less eco-friendly choices. Here are a few handy hints that might help vou have a greener Christmas.

• Use reusable rather than disposable:

Fabric napkins, rather than paper ones; ceramic plates and dishes rather than paper or plastic. Could you wrap gifts in fabric and ribbons or brown paper and decorative string, which could be kept and used again? I have recently discovered reusable Christmas crackers too see www.keepthiscracker.com. You have to provide the fillings yourself, but even the snaps are replaceable and compostable, as they are made from paper!



• Try to use natural materials for your decorations:

Glass baubles rather than plastic; a real tree rather than an artificial tree; pine cones and evergreen foliage. Remember to use what you have first though—don't buy replacements if what you have is perfectly good!

• Plan your food shopping:

Buy what you need for the number of people you are catering for, and remember to use up or freeze your leftovers.

· Gifts:

Consider asking people what they would actually like! Think about setting a budget, or suggesting a Secret Santa to reduce the amount spent or given. Perhaps you could give something home-made or created? Many people who live a green lifestyle are happy with second-hand items. I am always perfectly happy with 'pre-loved' books, and even CDs and DVDs! 'Experiences' rather than 'things' are another useful option, eg a theatre visit, annual membership to a favourite place, or a subscription.

However you spend Christmas, I hope that these tips will give you some food for thought. Nobody can make huge changes overnight, so even if you make only one change this Christmas it is a step in the right direction! You could always make a New Year's Resolution to work towards a greener 2019!


PRAYER FOR THE MONTH

The Wise Men came from the lands that are to the East of Palestine. One of the main routes was called the 'Incense Road' because merchants travelled along it with expensive incense and myrrh, sometimes exchanging them for gold.

FRANKINCENSE (often simply called 'incense') is a gum that comes from a tree. When added to a flame or very hot charcoal, sweet-smelling smoke comes off and rises in the air. One of the

smelling smoke comes off and rises in the air. One of the psalms in the Bible talks of 'my prayer rising before you, Lord, like incense'. Incense is sometimes burned in church as a sign of prayer and offering. Incense is often used at funerals, reminding us in prayer that the ordinary person is also very special.

If **GOLD** stands for the special things in life, and **MYRRH** represents the sorrow and difficulties, then **INCENSE** can stand for something in between. The ordinary things of life can become special depending on my attitude and how I go about them. For instance, such ordinary things as:



- all these 'ordinary' things of life I can transform by a positive attitude.



Let us pray:

Lord, as I offer you all that is ordinary and everyday in my life, I ask you to give me the power of your Spirit that I may transform each day by living with a positive attitude, looking for the best in people and situations. Inspire me to live in your presence every day so that I may share your outlook and do the ordinary things of life in an extraordinary way. May this, Lord, my prayer today, rise before you like the burning of incense.

MY FIRST SYNOD MEETING



It all started as a diagram on a piece of paper at a membership meeting. The church structure was outlined before me, and I thought, 'Why didn't I already know this?' I have been coming to Fleet URC for years, and have had the privilege to be christened, married, and have my own child christened here, but still I hadn't really appreciated the organisation behind the services and people.

So I took the opportunity of an open invitation, and a week later I was at my first Synod meeting. I was excited to learn more, and I wasn't disappointed.

The meeting started with worship, which was not unexpected, but certainly helped to relieve any trepidation at the thought of 'not fitting in', so by the time the main topic of discussion arose I was assured I was among friends. Although I cannot pretend to have understood all the ins and outs of the issue at hand (the change to equal Synod representation at assembly level), I was struck not only by the passion of those in discussion, but also by the understanding and patience of all those present. This, when combined with the open but ordered structure of debate, made for the fairest discussion forum I think I have ever heard. For me it showed the quality of the people in this church that no one was talked over, dismissed or silenced, either due to disagreement or to speed up proceedings. And yet it never degenerated into a forum for those with nothing to say—all those who spoke had a valid point or question, and by the end, even with the complexity of the decision reached, I had learned a lot.

The workshops provided a similar educational opportunity, and due to my personal experiences I was drawn to a talk on mental well-being. It was delivered in a humorous way and although it was only a brief introduction it gave me a lot to think about, both for my own mental health and that of those around me. I should like to learn more on the subject.

Another important topic being workshopped was becoming an 'eco-church', which I noted is being investigated by our church via Ruth and Margaret, and I look forward to action on the subject as it strikes me as an exciting prospect if it can be delivered.

After a break, when we were back together, we heard about some of the hard work going into community and youth engagement through summer activities, and this, along with the Synod Youth Executive calling for greater engagement, I found very uplifting.

Sadly there was a more negative topic for discussion in the struggles of Traidcraft plc. It seems so odd that there would even be an alternative to fair trade products in our supermarkets, let alone that those distributing them would struggle; but I can't deny that this stark reminder was probably a needed nudge to ensure that my family and I should watch what we buy. I hope there will be a happy resolution to their troubles.

During all this we discussed what we wanted from Synod in the future, and in my naivety I commented as before that it was easy to miss the developments and news from—and even the existence of—Synod in our week to week worship. I thought perhaps there should be more direct feedback from it.. In Ruth's usual logical fashion she replied, 'If you feel that way, why don't you write about it?' Well, now I have, and I would definitely encourage others to take an interest in these meetings.

I am looking forward to the opportunity to attend again with the church to whom I can now say that I officially belong.

COVENANT SERVICE REFLECTION

I am no longer my own but yours.
Put me to what you will,
rank me with whom you will;
put me to doing, put me to suffering;
let me be employed for you, or laid aside for you,
exalted for you, or brought low for you;
let me be full, let me be empty,
let me have all things, let me have nothing:

I freely and wholeheartedly yield all things to your pleasure and disposal.

And now, glorious and blessèd God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit, you are mine and I am yours.

And the covenant now made on earth, let it be ratified in heaven. *Amen.*

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On **Sunday 6th January** we shall be having a Covenant Service. The richness of this Methodist tradition has filtered down within the URC, and now many URC churches hold this service within the first few weeks of the New Year.

It is a celebration of all that God has done and an affirmation that we give our lives and choices

to God. It is an invitation for people to renew their covenant relationship with God, and it is a service that is particularly appropriate for the New Year.

The aim of the service is to help people hear God's offer and God's challenge; to provide space for God to prompt and for people to respond. Yet, it is more than this, for the Covenant Service is not just a one-to-one transaction between an individual and God, it is an act of the whole faith community. What God offers through the Covenant is a loving relationship. It is not a business contract set up between God and humanity for the provision of certain goods and services. Rather, it is the means of grace by which we accept the relationship God offers and then seek to sustain it:

The days are surely coming, says the Lord, when I will make a new covenant... I will put my law within them, and I will write it on their hearts; and I will be their God, and they shall be my people.

Jeremiah 31: 31, 33 (NRSV)

These words are read out as part of the Covenant Service. The focal point of the service is the Covenant Prayer (above). It embraces the whole of life, in all its parts. Most people find it quite tough to say this and really mean it. It is uncomfortable and challenging. It asks questions of our faith and demands that we examine our relationship with God.

The Covenant Prayer has been compared by some to a set of New Year resolutions, but ones that emphasise the importance of doing and being as much as believing. But more than that, the prayer represents a commitment to being a disciple and putting God first in our lives and in everything about our lives: what we do, what we say and who we are. It is both a surrender to, and a trust in, God. The final few words are a gracious reminder: 'You are mine and I am yours'. We don't pray and live just in our own strength—but in God's.

I told him how my husband was on the camel behind me and when we walked in a long line of camels his beast kept nudging my delightful beast. I was glad to get off at the end of the ride.




