You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; You have anointed my head with oil; My cup overflows. Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life: and I shall dwell in the house of the Lord Forever.

Second reading: John 10: 1-10

read by John Gibbons

10"Very truly, I tell you, anyone who does not enter the sheepfold by the gate but climbs in by another way is a thief and a bandit. ²The one who enters by the gate is the shepherd of the sheep. ³The gatekeeper opens the gate for him, and the sheep hear his voice. He calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. ⁴When he has brought out all his own, he goes ahead of them, and the sheep follow him because they know his voice. ⁵They will not follow a stranger, but they will run from him because they do not know the voice of strangers." ⁶Jesus used this figure of speech with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them. ⁷So again Jesus said to them, "Very truly, I tell you, I am the gate for the sheep. ⁸All who came before me are thieves and bandits; but the sheep did not listen to them. ⁹I am the gate. Whoever enters by me will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture. ¹⁰The thief comes only to steal and kill and destroy. I came that they may have life, and have it abundantly.

Talk by Rev'd Ruth Dillon

Psalm 23/ John 10:1-10

When many people hear the words of Psalm 23, and the image that comes to mind, is one of England's rolling green pastures, with Jesus guiding the sheep, that peacefully graze on lush green shoots of grass, with a gentle stream in the distance. It was a Psalm that many of us learned by heart, in church or heard it to the familiar tune of Crimond.

I am sorry to say that in Palestine, when shepherds tended their flock in Palestine, it was far from that, it was a hard-laborious task. The hills were high, rugged, dangerous, dry with truly little grass; in fact, from a distance you could hardly see any grass. The shepherds had to find small tufts of grass for the sheep to graze upon, and so the skill of the shepherd was to lead the sheep to areas of nutritional pasture, on a steep hillside. If a sheep wandered off, they could die because of lack of grass, and water, that lay as drops on the tough grass in the early cool of the day. I have attached a U-tube video link for you to see after the service that wonderfully describes the landscape that Jesus would have been used to seeing the shepherds on the hillside.

Like the sheep on the rugged hillside, some sheep maybe weakened by attack of wolves or other diseases, and the shepherd will tend and care for them in their final hours.

The two landscapes I have illustrated in Psalm 23 are very different, and that is a little bit like the landscape we have now before Covid 19 and now. Society is different and we will all be changed in some way, only time will tell what shape that change will look. The sheepfold is like our home, where we can be safe from the virus, but venture out, we do so at our own risk. We need the comfort, and knowledge that other sheep are safe, with the sheepfold, and are concerned when one escapes and becomes vulnerable.

Psalm 23 spoke to over the last few weeks. I have felt the prayers and concerns of you all whilst I have had coronavirus, but I was safe in the knowledge that Jesus is my Good Shepherd, and obviously has more work for me to do.

As Psalm 23 is often said at funerals, and as the death figures in care homes and communities are now added to hospital numbers, the victims of coronavirus will now dramatically increase, and we think about the people who have left us and been guided to their eternal home.

As people of faith, we are assured of Jesus guiding and leading us to those pastures where we can be rested, nourished and cared for, however when this familiar Psalm 23 is being read today, we reflect today on the relatives grieving, the concerned patients, the pressure on the many people in the NHS and care staff who are trying to help people gain strength to join the sheepfold, where Jesus can care for them.

The hymn we shall sing together today is 'The King of Love my Shepherd is'.

Hymn:

The King of love my shepherd is, whose goodness faileth never; I nothing lack if I am his, and he is mine for ever.

Where streams of living water flow, my ransomed soul he leadeth, and where the verdant pastures grow, with food celestial feedeth.

Perverse and foolish oft I strayed, but yet in love He sought me, and on his shoulder gently laid, and home, rejoicing, brought me.

In death's dark vale I fear no ill with thee, dear Lord, beside me; thy rod and staff my comfort still, thy cross before to guide me.

Thou spread'st a table in my sight; thy unction grace bestoweth; and O what transport of delight from thy pure chalice floweth!

And so through all the length of days thy goodness faileth never: Good Shepherd, may I sing thy praise within thy house for ever.
