As many of us have returned from holidays and time away, we have delighted in your planet, its variety in nature, its laughter with family and friends, its stillness in contemplation.

We have probably reflected on what this year 2020 has brought us: uncertainty in our living, lack of funds to sustain the global economy, lack of funds to sustain your world and the environment.

As we grieve for those who have died from Covid 19, lives lost from all over our land, old and young, fit and frail, care-worker and bus driver, nurse and doctor. We are saddened that we have to accept: our failure to plan, our failure to learn the lessons, our failure to care for our world, and our failure to treat nature and

animal life with respect.

our sorrow into action, our failure into change, our guilt into grace.

And now let us be silent before God as we open our hearts to seek God's forgiveness.

God in whom we live and move and have our being,
Your tenderness and mercy surrounding us,
and making us whole again - restored, forgiven and free.

In your sight we are new creations, full of potential and vessels of love. Let us be the action you desire, the wisdom you crave for And the faithfulness you deserve.

You say to each one of us, *your sins* are truly forgiven; yet you also say these words, *come now and follow me*.

And now let us say the prayer that Jesus taught his friends to say:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come; thy will be done, in earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread. And forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those that trespass against us. And lead us not into temptation; but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kingdom, the power, and the glory, for ever and ever. Amen.

Reflection

May the words of my mouth and the meditation of all our hearts here this morning be acceptable to you, O Lord and our strength, Amen Today is the start of Creation time, a six-week period when Churches Together in Britain and Ireland remind themselves of what is means to care for this planet we live on, God's planet.

I am constantly amazed how God shows and points me in ways to encourage me, which I can then share with you via a podcast, conversation or through worship;' and today is no different.

I have just returned from five days away in Cornwall, with my eldest daughter Katharine, her husband Jonathan and my grandson Mathias. And for those who heard my Podcast this week entitled a 'Bubble of Peace', these words may be familiar to you. Three situations occurred where I felt God's presence near me, nudging me to reflect on these precious times.

 The first recollection was when each morning I would sit in the front porch outside the cottage. It was sheltered from the wind and rain with the morning sun streaming onto my slate seat. On the Wednesday the storms came. The rain had battered the surrounding fields, but by 9am, although the sun was shining, the winds were very strong and making a real howling sound. As I sat there, I felt no breeze, only the sun on my face, and the words of Elijah came to my mind: 'the Lord is about to pass by'. As I got up from my seat and peeked round the porch, I saw in the sky a rainbow, a sign of God's promise, a sign of God's love, a sign of God's everlasting grace... I felt blessed.

 The second recollection is in the same location, the small slate front porch on this 18th-century cottage. As I looked up I saw a swallow's nest, now vacant, but it had obviously been a haven for the swallows when they brought their family this year. As I thought about where they were flying, over seas and continents to South Africa, I reflected that these small birds were protected by God, as they undertook this journey. We too are protected as we take our journey, knowing the direction we need to take, but requiring God's guidance in sunshine and moonlight..... I felt loved.

• The third recollection was after the storm, when the fruits of the damson tree had fallen to the ground, and Mathias asked if we could go out to pick the fallen fruit. As he stood collecting the damsons from the ground, I wondered how many times the old damson tree had given its fruit to the earth and its inhabitants. As we collected the damsons, marvelling at their ripeness, I thanked God that we were part of a long line of people collecting the fruit from the earth.... I felt grateful.

The Bubbles of Peace that emerged last week - the rainbow, the journey and the fruits, all reminded me that we are part of God's world, the planet, the seasons, and part of nature, and together we enable this planet to function.

However, if one piece of the jigsaw of creation is out of place, then chaos prevails.

If it rained constantly, and the rain was polluted through neglect of our planet, the earth and the seas would suffer, the crops would fail, and there would be difficulty in ever seeing a Rainbow. Nature and

humanity would bear the brunt of such neglect. Crops and fruit would suffer, and indeed the earth would groan under the weight of abandonment and disaster.

As anyone knows who has travelled in torrential rain, it is not an easy journey. The rain bounces, the vision becomes obscured and the driving rain forces us to stop our journey for a while until we get our bearings. We become disorientated, unaware of our surroundings.

In many ways we, as humanity, have become disoriented and unaware of our surroundings, unaware of the abuse we have all contributed to over the years. Yet although the creative clock is nearly at the stroke of midnight, there is still time to halt the way we have neglected our planet.

One of the most memorable quotes I have ever heard over the years is...

Tread gently on the earth.

Tread gently on the earth, means to be careful how we place our bodies, how we use our hands, how we travel, to be aware of sustainable energy, be aware of polluting the earth with plastic, be aware of the abuse of fossil fuels, of disturbing the habitants of animals who have lived on this earth far longer than we have.

Tread gently on the earth means adhering to the call of Jesus, listening to earth's call of partnership, of justice when we see others tread loudly and abusively on the earth. It means listening to what the earth is saying, its groaning, its energy, and listening to its heartbeat.

Tread gently on the earth means listening to the Spirit that breathes through all creation, the spirit who created life, and now watching the same life be extinguished. The Spirit's wingbeats attempting to touch each individual and to awaken their senses.

At this start of Creation Time, I invite you to look within yourself, and ask are you treading gently upon this earth?

To look at the community and ask how can I assist the community to tread gently upon this earth?

To look at the world and ask how can I assist organizations to tread gently on this earth?

The responsibility is ours.

I pray that in years to come, another grandma can sit on the slate seat at the cottage in Cornwall, and be able to appreciate the weather, the birds and fruits; let's hope and pray we have not left it too late.

Although this hymn is usually sung at Harvest time, it does reflect the variety of ways God provides for us and our responsibility for the upkeep and care for the earth.

For the harvests of the Spirit, thanks be to God; for the good we all inherit, thanks be to God; for the wonders that astound us, for the truths that still confound us, most of all that love has found us, thanks be to God.
