FROM THE MANSE



Dear Friends

Twelve months ago this week I caught the COVID virus. My goodness, how my life has changed!

My story is how one event changed my life, my path and my future, and although my expectations have been altered, my faith and hope in God has remained strong for whatever lies ahead of me.

The events of Holy Week were also one thing that changed Jesus's life and, even though we hear the story year after year, we know the outcome that leads to Jesus's painful death on the cross.

Unexpected events can change our life, so that we find ourselves on another path, feeling full of trepidation and unease—even though it can be exciting at the same time.

Whatever unexpected events have happened or will happen in your life, please take comfort from knowing that you are not alone; that Jesus has gone before you to smooth your road. Know this, my friends, that we can never return to the path we want to travel on, because each event—whether expected or unexpected—changes us and those around us.

One hymn that I will enjoy singing this Easter Day is, 'Thine be the Glory',

and the lines in the second verse particularly resonate with me this Easter:

Lo, Jesus meet us, risen from the tomb, Lovingly he greets us, scatters fear and gloom. Let the church with gladness hymns of triumph sing, for her Lord now liveth, death has lost its sting.'

Whatever anxieties or pressures we may feel, whether because of a relationship, a friendship, or something within the church, know that Jesus meets us where we are at; he lovingly embraces us and says, 'I know what you are going through, and I will fill you with an abundance of my love'.

The 'church' in the hymn verse refers to our own sacred place of worship, but also to God's people who live and breathe its values and mission; for we Jesus followers are the Church wherever we meet, whether it be on Zoom, Facebook, on the phone or—eventually—gathered together physically worshipping in one place. For this let us always be glad and feel blessed, for whatever lies ahead we rest in the knowledge that Jesus has broken the gates of death (both literally and metaphorically) so that we can live life in all its fullness in the presence of God.

Spring and beyond...

As the buds start to flower I await my future with excitement and trepidation, unsure what may lie ahead for me; but as the seasons come and go I know that new buds will bloom in my garden for the Lord, and I will find myself surrounded by familiar flowers—and different ones—all provided by God.

Lord, as the Christian season flows onward in 2021, enable us to see new growth in the Spring during Pentecost, ... and give thanks for your Spirit.

Enable us to see different flowers in our Summer garden, that bloom in our Christian lives, ... and give thanks for your Spirit.

Enable us to see vibrant colours in the Autumn and the reaping of Harvest

... and give thanks for your Spirit.

Enable us to approach the Winter knowing that Jesus is comforting us in the unseen changes that occur, namely in a baby that will change the world, ... and give thanks to your Spirit.

NURTURE YOUR FAITH GROUP

Our next series: 'Standing in the Sandals of the Prophets'

The current Lent group series of Bible-based discussions has so far taken us to identify Seeds of Hope in a parable, in times when Jesus was in prayer, and in familiar as well as very unfamiliar Old Testament texts telling us about the prophets. We also ventured into some of the Epistles and the Easter narrative.

After Easter we are setting out on a new adventure, delving into the ministry of some of the lesser known prophets of the Old Testament. *'Standing in the Sandals of the Prophets'* invites us to look at the time and cultural influences within which they were living, to think about how they responded to God's call, the problems they faced, and how they developed their relationship with God. What can we learn from these



books we have probably never read or only heard the odd verse quoted in a service reading? What does their experience mean for us as we walk the way of discipleship? Who knows?

We will be standing in the sandals of Nehemiah at our Zoom group on **Monday 19th April at 11 am**. Perhaps only for that session, or longer if there is more to consider. Which prophet's story we read next is in your hands. Amos, Habakkuk, Haggai, Hosea, Joel, Jonah, Malachi, Micah, Nahum, Obadiah, Zechariah are all waiting for us to slip on their sandals!

Join us to sit and listen or to read a passage you have found in the text you like, or to share your thinking about their lives and work—but do join us for a friendly stroll into their world. You just need to read their book before the session, and background notes will be available each month.

SIGHT LOSS FRIENDLY CHURCH

A new venture: Becoming a Sight Loss Friendly church at Beacon Hill

Did you know that the Torch Trust, a Christian sight loss charity, has a new FREE initiative—Sight Loss Friendly Church (SLFC)—which has been developed to help churches to become accessible for people with sight loss? We have responded to that idea at Beacon Hill during the lockdown period because we know that quite a few people in the church family have sight related conditions and we want to make all we do as accessible as possible. By



registering, anyone with a sight impairment will be able to identify that we are a church that would make them welcome.

Torch Trust believe that to become sight loss friendly we need to follow three principles:

THINK: When planning church events, services or communications, think to ourselves, 'What can we do to include blind or partially sighted people?'

ASK: Approach individuals and ask what would be best for them.

ACT: Make changes, adapt room layouts or see how the many resources Torch Trust have available might be used so that everyone with sight loss feels included in church.

We are just starting out exploring how we can do better, and will be talking to the church community individually about how the website, online and church-based worship and other ways we communicate can be adapted to take sight loss into account. The Trust offers training and resources for anyone in the church, so we are hoping soon to have some specific training on being more welcoming and responsive. We'll let you know how that goes!

Someone in the UK is told they are going blind every six minutes. This shocking fact makes a warm welcome so important as a Christian community. You might like to look at this video:

The good news is that we have plenty of aluminium containers still unused, and a third takeaway event is already in the planning stage!

email. A team of volunteers also records these as podcasts, which you can listen to in a variety of ways—even asking Alexa or Siri to read them to you!

GOLDEN JOTTINGS NO 2: ALWAYS LOOK UP

The second in a series of reminiscences by Bernard and Mavis Potter, marking their 50 years of membership at Fleet URC.

From time to time many United Reformed Churches have a visit from the Moderator of General Assembly. I suppose it is the equivalent in hierarchical terms of the Archbishop of Canterbury, the leader of the denomination they serve.

The last Moderator who led worship at Fleet URC was Revd Nigel Uden, quite recently—just before lockdown in 2020. His theme was 'Epiphany People'. His sermon gave everyone much to think about, especially so close to what would follow with Covid-19 and its subsequent ramifications.

Before that Mr John Ellis came and shared in our church celebrations of 100 years of Worship and Witness.

The previous Moderator to lead worship

prior to that was Revd C Cyril Franks during his time as Moderator, 1987—88. In those days there was a certain amount of trepidation when national leaders from whatever organisations they represented visited a group. In this case, minds were soon put at rest when we learned that the area was familiar to him, having served during World War II just a couple of miles away in the RAMC at Crookham. He worshipped during that time at our church, which was of course the Congregational Church.

His visit was over 30 years ago, but it was something he did rather than something he said that remained in the mind. He used postage stamps on the ceiling in the vestibule. I don't know how he got the stamps on the ceiling, but as youngsters we did something similar with tiny goblets made from silver paper. During his talk he asked the congregations how many people had seen what was on the ceiling when they arrived for the Service—the answer, NONE! It was a powerful illustration as the basis for the Service, and an encouragement to 'Always Look Up'.

EARTH DAY: 22nd April, 2021

I know I am at risk of appearing to be a climate change obsessive or an environmental finger-wager, but given that Spring is in the air I would like to draw your attention to Earth Day (sometimes confusingly called Earth Hour Day), which takes place every year on 22nd April.

Begun in 1970 in response to a massive oil spill off the California coast, it is coordinated by the Earth Day Network (EDN): https://www.earthday.org/. It has gone from strength to strength, and is now the world's largest civil event. Last year it was supported in 193 countries, and about one billion people worldwide participated in it—either passively (by tuning into it, or just by being aware of it), or actively (by changing some aspect of their daily routines/choices).

Earth Day 2016 was marked by the opening for signature of the Paris Agreement on Climate Change. This year's Earth Day will be marked by, amongst other things, President Biden convening a world leaders' climate summit.

But Earth Day is not just for the Great and the Good. It focuses globally on education, volunteering, art and events (which this year will be mostly online). Those of you who are teachers or otherwise engaged in education might be interested in this: https://www.twinkl.co.uk/event/earth-day-2021. Something which could be of interest to just about everyone is the Earth Day Network's promotion of Citizen Science, which encourages people to gather environmental information—for

example about air quality, water quality, insect populations, bees, plastic pollution—partly by the use of smartphone apps. There are Citizen Science websites based in many countries across the globe, and if you type 'citizen science uk' into your browser you will find a number of interesting websites. Here are a couple of them: https://www.nhm.ac.uk/take-part/citizen-science.html.

Following on from Grace Bagshaw's articles in *InTouch*, at an everyday level there are many practical things we can do to reduce our environmental impact, if we are not doing them already. I came across this article in the BBC *Science Focus* magazine: http://www.sciencefocus.com/planet-earth/13-things-you-can-do-on-earth-day-or-everyday-to-help-the-planet. Here are just some of the thirteen suggestions:

- Plant a tree.
- For shopping, use a jute bag rather than plastic (jute being a natural fibre which lasts a very long time and which doesn't make big demands

on land and water resources): https://greencleanguide.com/8-undeniable-eco-friendly-qualities-of-jute/.

- If possible walk or ride a bike rather than drive.
- Shop at farmers' markets. There is less packaging there than at supermarkets and other shops and, unless you have to travel a long way to reach one, the combined transport costs/CO₂ footprint for the food and for the customer is likely to be less. There are monthly farmers' markets at Farnham and at Camberley, but the farmers' market at Haslemere is currently on hold due to the pandemic.
- Try to avoid buying water in plastic bottles.
- If you have a garden and don't have a compost heap, start one particularly if you live in Hampshire, where there are no Council food waste collections.
- If you have a computer, switch to paperless bills.

If you think this is all rather Nanny State, please consider the Biblical injunction, 'The land must not be sold permanently because the land is mine and you are but aliens and my tenants. Throughout the country that you hold as a possession you must provide for the redemption of the land.' (Leviticus 25: 23-24). For 'country' I think one could also read 'planet'!

REWILDING FOR NATURE

Last summer we didn't mow our front lawn, except for a narrow border around the edge to keep it from looking neglected. We have always had some beautiful ox eye daisies come up which we have carefully mowed around in the past, but we decided to just let it be last summer. It was interesting to see what uр and we noticed came neighbours and others walking past would stop and look. They'd chat about the flowers to each other and to us if we happened to be there. It became a real talking point. We were delighted with our project to let nature thrive. We even



scattered more wild flower seeds in the Autumn, to increase the diversity of our mini-meadow.

I then came across the Blue Campaign. This was conceived in 2014 to combat the decline in biodiversity and biomass around the UK and promotes the 'rewilding' of our gardens, parks, verges and school grounds. A blue heart (now the official symbol of rewilding) can be placed in the area being rewilded to communicate that it is a deliberate act rather than the sign of a lazy gardener!

It doesn't matter how big or small our gardens, we can all take part. According to http://www.bluecampaignhub.com there are 15 million gardens



across the UK, and one of them is yours! By leaving just a small part of your garden wild you are giving back to nature and allowing plants, birds, bees, bugs, butterflies, frogs and reptiles to thrive.

So will we be mowing our front lawn this summer? No, we won't. The lawn will be left to do its own thing again and we will be watching with interest to see what flowers and insects arrive, but we will be 'planting' a blue heart to show our support for the

funds for healthcare in the developing world. The appeal has been initiated in support of Christian Aid's work, and all donations will support Christian Aid's response to the coronavirus pandemic in affected communities around the world, including our *Commitment for Life* partner regions.

In the UK well over 50% of the adult population have currently (*April 2021*) received their first dose of Covid vaccine, but for the poorest and most vulnerable communities across the world there is little hope of a vaccine rollout. These are people who already face lack of water, food, and basic healthcare. Christian Aid is working in these places, helping keep people safe from coronavirus, and the URC's campaign will help the charity do more.

BIBLE CAKE

Have fun exploring the scriptures for the ingredients, and then invite friends round to enjoy the finished product while remembering to keep an appropriate social distance, of course!

Heat oven to 150°C (300°F, Gas mark 2).



Ingredients:

- 1. 2 teacups 1 Samuel 30:12 (second ingredient)
- 2. 2 cups Nahum 3:12
- 3. ½ cup Numbers 17:8 (plus a few for decoration)
- 4. 8 oz (225g) Psalm 55:21
- 5. 2 cups Jeremiah 6:20 (sugar!)
- 6. 4½ cups 1 Kings 4:22

- 7. 6 of Jeremiah 17:11
- 8. 2 tbsps 1 Samuel 14:25
- 9. 1 pinch Leviticus 2:13
- 10. 2 tsps. Amos 4:5 (crumbs)
- 11. 1 cup Judges 5:25 (2nd liquid)
- 12. ½cup Judges 4:19 (1st liquid)
- 13. Season with 2 Chronicles 9:9

Grease and line an 8-inch cake tin.

Separate 1. Chop 2 and 3. Set aside.

Blend 4 and 5. Add 6 gradually. Beat 7 and add 8, 9 and 10.

Stir in 1, 2 and 3. Add 11 and 12 as necessary. Blend in 13.

Put into prepared tin, decorate with a few flaked 3s, and bake on a low shelf for 3½ hours.

If the top browns prematurely, reduce heat to 140°C (275°F, Gas mark 1) and cover with greaseproof paper.

Eat with prayer and thanksgiving, and resolve to follow the example of 2 Timothy 1:7!
