

Reading: Acts 11: 1 – 18 read by Mike Walters

1 The apostles and the believers throughout Judea heard that the Gentiles also had received the word of God. 2 So when Peter went up to Jerusalem, the circumcised believers criticized him 3 and said, "You went into the house of uncircumcised men and ate with them."

4 Starting from the beginning, Peter told them the whole story:

5 "I was in the city of Joppa praying, and in a trance I saw a vision. I saw something like a large sheet being let down from heaven by its four corners, and it came down to where I was. 6 I looked into it and saw four-footed animals of the earth, wild beasts, reptiles and birds. 7 Then I heard a voice telling me, 'Get up, Peter. Kill and eat.'

8 "I replied, 'Surely not, Lord! Nothing impure or unclean has ever entered my mouth.' 9 "The voice spoke from heaven a second time, 'Do not call anything impure that God has made clean.'

10 This happened three times, and then it was all pulled up to heaven again.

11 "Right then three men who had been sent to me from Caesarea stopped at the house where I was staying. 12 The Spirit told me to have no hesitation about going with them. These six brothers also went with me, and we entered the man's house. 13 He told us how he had seen an angel appear in his house and say, 'Send to Joppa for Simon who is called Peter. 14 He will bring you a message through which you and all your household will be saved.'
15 "As I began to speak, the Holy Spirit came on them as he had come on us at the beginning. 16 Then I remembered what the Lord had said: 'John baptized with water, but you will be baptized with the Holy Spirit.' 17 So if God gave them the same gift he gave us who believed in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I to think that I could stand in God's way?"

18 When they heard this, they had no further objections and praised God, saying, "So then, even to Gentiles God has granted repentance that leads to life."

Reflection:

I'm sure in your reading of the Bible you have come across individuals who you immediately respond to. In our recent Bible study meetings we stood in the sandals of Nehemiah and I must say his commitment, his love for God and how he leads the rebuilding of the city wall in Jerusalem sparked my admiration, of those attributes as well as his leadership skills. And today, as we continue our mini-series looking at the Book of Acts I find myself drawn to Peter the Apostle, mainly, I realise, because I really don't recognise this man in the Book of Acts from everything about him in the Gospels! What a transformation from fisherman to orator; from impulsive to considered; from denial to conviction of faith.

Let's just remind ourselves of his story. Impulsive, likeable, loud Peter, called by Jesus by the Sea of Galilee, following Jesus throughout his ministry and revealing his character as he did so. Think of some of his impulsive actions: in Capernaum Peter invited Jesus and the disciples to his house even though his wife's mother was sick in bed (Mark 1:29-30). When Peter saw Jesus walking on water, he said, "Lord, if it is You, command me to come to You on the water" (Matthew 14:28). He impulsively hurt the servant of the high priest (John 18:10). When Christ appeared to Peter and some of the other disciples when they were fishing, Peter "put on his outer garment and plunged into the sea" (John 21:7).

Peter was outspoken. When Jesus asked His disciples, "But who do you say that I am?" Peter immediately and emphatically stated, "You are the Christ, the Son of the living God" (Matthew 16:15-16). Jesus was clearly pleased with Peter's understanding.

Right after that, Jesus described his coming death and the events that would lead up to that. Then audacious Peter took Jesus to one side and began to *rebuke* him. We all know of Peter's denial of following Jesus, how that affected him and the restoration of relationship and commissioning by Jesus in the resurrection appearances.

Poor Peter. He has moments of such insight and other moments of putting his foot in it. And yet, he was the one given the task to build the church and be the keeper of the keys, to be the rock on which the church will be founded. His humanity is so real all these years later.

Then - at Pentecost - we heard how Peter received the Holy Spirit and boldly proclaimed that Jesus was the long-awaited Messiah. This Peter called the crowd to repentance, to recognize the ways in which they had turned from God's path, to yield their hearts and lives to God. We see an added dimension of maturity, wisdom and knowledge of Scripture, clearly inspired by God's Holy Spirit. With his second sermon in Acts 2 that we heard last week, we see a mighty preacher of the gospel giving a focused and powerful masterpiece of a sermon to the Jewish authorities.

Filled with the Holy Spirit, Peter had the gifts to be able to preach and heal and bring others to Christ. But Peter still had to wrestle with his faith understanding. Faced with the success of the gospel message, and what he was experiencing, Peter had to rethink his views on the Jewish laws and dietary requirements. In today's reading we heard how he ate with Gentiles and the reaction of the early Jewish Christians to this. He, and the church, had to decide: did new converts have to follow those old rules? What did it mean to be a first century Christian?

What the story of Peter tells us about is a dynamic, changing understanding & fulfilment of faith. Truly being a disciple. Filled with the Holy Spirit, Peter's views did not stay static. He faithfully grew and changed and matured in the faith. I know that I am not

the same person of faith as the one who started training to be a Lay Preacher. My outlook on all sorts of things has changed over time. We can learn from Peter that it is okay to change. To have our eyes opened to things we have not noticed before and to show others that the gospel is good news to all.

This is a story of discipleship, a reminder when we think about our own discipleship journey that it does not always follow the path we might have expected. What a discipleship journey Peter had. What a difference the Holy Spirit made to his life and can make in our lives. What a lot we can learn from Peter: Spirit Enabled!

We too are called to respond to Jesus' call in our lives in a way that is good news for the whole world. In this transitional time may we listen and wait for moments of the Holy Spirit touching and warming our hearts. May we declare with Peter the good news that Jesus was indeed the Messiah, the Son of God. And perhaps with some trepidation, let us build Christ's Church on the foundation laid by Peter and those who have come since, keeping, adapting and innovating when we need to, but always for the glory of God.

Who would have expected Simon who was called from his every day work as a fisherman to be such an example of faith & discipleship – to be that Fisher of Men? For the faithful witness of Peter: Thanks be to God.

Intercessory prayer 'And as I began to speak ...

based on Acts 11.15

'And as I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell upon them just as it had upon us at the beginning.'

Lord, we know that we tend to love those like ourselves. We are prone to think of people who are hard to love as 'out there', not in our backyards. But they are sometimes much closer than that, they are in our family.

And, dare we admit, sometimes it is ourselves whom we find difficult to love.

Holy Spirit, fall on us.

We pray now for our families, for our nearest and dearest. They don't always choose the lifestyle we would choose for them, but, Lord, we pray you would help us to walk wisely alongside them, being there for them, but not in their face. Help us to remember that you don't work on just one side of the equation; you are with them as much as you are with us. May we all be guided by your Spirit, as we look for glimpses of your glory in those around us. **Holy Spirit, fall on us.**

We pray for those 'out there', that we would not so much seek to bring them in, as to be ready and willing to be out there with them at their point of need.

Holy Spirit, fall on us.

Lord, we sometimes walk a difficult path between being true to ourselves, and not offending others. We pray for:

those we find difficult to love because they are different, those we perhaps feel might help themselves more, those who haven't had our advantages.

We pray for a spirit of openness and a willingness to see your glory everywhere.

Holy Spirit, fall on us. Amen.
