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#### A CHRISTMAS MESSAGE FOR ALL FROM REVD HELEN EVERARD



#### Dear Friends

I am afraid that, for many people, this Christmas will feel more like 'In the Bleak Midwinter' than 'God Rest You Merry Gentlemen'. I live next door to a petrol station and I see the price of fuel rising almost every day at the moment. And with climate change and the war in Ukraine we are all feeling insecure, wondering what 2023 will be like.

When Jesus was born, circumstances for the ordinary people of that time, like Mary and Joseph, were tough

and uncertain too. God chose to come to earth as God With Us at a difficult moment in Israel's history. Remember, Jesus was born without a comfortable home, and was laid in a feeding trough because there was no room for him in a strange town, where Mary had come at the arbitrary request of an occupying power.

God might have preferred, we think, to wait for a better time. Why would God send Jesus to such difficulty? His family were forced to flee to Egypt, for fear of Herod.

However this is always the promise of Christmas. God did not send Jesus to a comfortable home with plenty to eat and more presents than he knew what to do with. God is truly at home with those who don't know where their next meal is coming from. We can welcome him into our homes and our lives even if we feel we don't have anything to offer, because he knew how hard life is for those on the edge. Remember that the Magi looked for Jesus in the palace because they were expecting a King; but Jesus was a different kind of King, the Servant King, born as an ordinary child, not protected by power or money.

And when we welcome him in to our hearts, then he gives us the gift of becoming part of his family, welcomed as a child of God. So let our prayer be 'O come to us, abide with us, our Lord Emmanuel', because with God everything is possible for 2023.

# IN MEMORIAM We have said go



We have said goodbye to two members of our church at Beacon Hill in 2022. As the year draws to a close, we would like to remember them in prayer and share a little about their lives.

**Sybil Saunders**, dearly loved wife to Roger, died after some illness in the Spring of 2022. She lived a busy life, always on the go, committed to her faith, from a childhood living on a farm next door to a church, hopping over the wall to attend the services there, to serving as an Elder both at Liss URC and Beacon Hill URC. Sybil looked forward to harvest services that reminded her of her early years on the farm and her delight in preparing food for others.

She wasn't afraid of hard work, juggling jobs in school catering, training to be a teacher and, at one point, holding a night time job at the Hindhead telephone exchange. Sybil was involved in supporting charities throughout her life, bringing her professional skills in catering to bear on many occasions at church family celebrations, providing refreshments for the Grayshott Concerts and other charity events.

Sybil's laugh was infectious, joyful and always made everyone who heard it smile with her. Her faith was a living, heartfelt and special part of her everyday life.

John had been in residential care for some time as his fitness decreased. Following Pat's death he moved to Farnham, and was about to transfer his membership to The Spire when he passed away.

#### **'STAND BY ME'**

In the last copy of *In Touch*, we heard a bit more about Laurith and her community in Columbia. This time, let's find out some more about one of our other sponsored children, Arsema



Arsema lives in Bekoji, Ethopia, and is 8 years old.

Bekoji, at 2810m above sea level, is four hours' drive south of the capital city, Addis Ababa, and has historically produced a number of world and Olympic champion distance running athletes, including Deratu Tulu, Kenenisa Bekele and Tirinush Dibaba. Bekoji is an extremely poor town with no paved roads, no clean running water, as well as an intermittent and not widespread

electricity supply and little to no health care provision. Arsema lives with her family of seven in a one-room rented house in Bekoji with a wooden bed, and only old blankets to keep warm, having moved there when their previous town became too expensive for them to live in.

Stand By Me adopted the Bethany School in Bekoji in 2006, when it consisted of two mud-built rooms with no toilets, running water, or even books or pencils, but was still providing education to 220 of the poorest children in the town. Over the past 15 years it has grown into a purpose-built school with 12 classrooms, dining hall, kitchen and library, and

now provides free teaching, hot meals and health care for over 500 children each day. There is also a children's village, which consists of several family homes run by dedicated house parents, typically widowed mothers. These were created to care for orphaned and abandoned children from the area, many of whose families have been affected by HIV/Aids.

Arsema had been unable to attend school as her parents, who work as daily labourers, could not afford to send her or her siblings (three brothers and one sister). She is now thriving at Bethany School, becoming more confident and sociable, and tells us that her favourite lessons are maths and science. She wants to be a teacher when she grows up. Her favourite pastime is skipping, and pasta is her favourite food.

In Ethiopia as a whole, only 20% of girls and 31% of boys enrol in secondary school. This year, two children who joined Bethany School in 2006, when aged 11 and 9 (and in similar circumstances to Arsema), graduated from university with degrees in Electrical and Computer Engineering and Bio-System Engineering respectively, breaking the cycle of poverty to create a better future for themselves and their families.

#### **GOLDEN JOTTINGS NO 7: EMBROIDERED KNEELERS**

A series of reminiscences by Bernard and Mavis Potter, marking their 50 years of membership at Fleet URC.

Not many people will remember these embroidered kneelers. Where did they come from? What were they for?





In 1977 All Saints Parish Church embarked on a project to refurbish the church with embroidered kneelers. Three hundred were produced by members of their own fellowship together with children from local schools and local churches in the town, as well as local organisations and businesses.

It was an enterprise which embraced much of the town. The youngest embroiderer was 11 years old, the oldest 88 years. Pictures of our embroidered kneelers are part of this jotting, and were produced by members of the Afternoon Women's Fellowship.

Unfortunately I think most of the kneelers were destroyed by the All Saints fire in 2015, which almost destroyed the church building as well.

I am grateful we have a photographic record of our contribution, if for no other reason than it reminds us of the part Fleet United Reformed Church has contributed over the years—and still does—in the role the local churches play in the life of Fleet.

As a matter of interest, kneelers were also provided for the choir stalls showing the opening bars of Stanford's *For All The Saints*.

#### **CHRISTMAS WREATHS**

As I prepare to make the Advent Ring for our Christmas services, I thought I would explore the meaning of the Christmas wreath.

Hanging a wreath on a door or a wall is almost as essential to Christmas as putting up a Christmas tree.

They say that the tree gave birth to the wreath. Pruning the tree was a part of the preparation process just as it is today: limbs are cut off to make the tree a better shape and to fit into our homes. Instead of throwing the pieces of greenery away, the excess was woven into wreaths.

Before the wreath became associated with Christmas, it was a prominent emblem of victory and power, especially in ancient Greece and Rome. A crown of leaves or flowers represented honour, glory and joy.

The first Christian wreaths originally served as Christmas tree ornaments, and not as the standalone decorations we're familiar with on our doors today. They were formed into rounds as it was easy to hang them on to the branches of a tree; but the shape was also significant as a representation of divine perfection, symbolizing eternity, as a circle has no end.

Equally important was the material forming the wreaths. Evergreens were looked upon with awe and admiration, living things that survived the harshness of winter. It was also the symbol of power, of resilience and, in a way, of hope. Holly leaves and berries represent the crown of thorns and Jesus's blood. The pine cones symbolise the resurrection and, together with the circular shape, make the wreath a representation of eternal life.

Christians in Europe often place candles on the wreath during Advent, to symbolise the light that Jesus brought into the world:

The candle lit on the first Sunday of Advent represents HOPE and the prophets of the Old Testament; the second candle represents FAITH and Mary and Joseph's journey to Bethlehem; the third candle signifies JOY and the shepherds; and the fourth represents PEACE and the angels, with their message of peace on Earth and good will to all men.

The fifth candle represents the BIRTH OF CHRIST. The flame of this candle reminds us that He is the

light of the world, and that if we follow Him we will never walk in darkness.

Despite its widespread popularity today, the wreath started with humble beginnings. We live very much in a throwaway culture, and it is nice to think that our wreaths are born out of discarded tree cuttings.

#### SOME THOUGHTS ON RECYCLING

I recently read that the concept of recycling plastic was broken from its inception. It is certainly a difficult substance to recycle, especially when combined with other substances, eg in a tetrapak. Many products claim to be recyclable, but that depends on local facilities. In Hart the only plastic that is recyclable is anything bottle shaped. This is the best quality plastic as it is strong and can be recycled most easily. All other plastics are best put in your black bin. These will then be burnt and the energy recovered. The best thing that we can all do is avoid plastic at every opportunity.

There are many opportunities to recycle other items, some of which I have mentioned here previously. At Fleet URC we have four collection tubs, two of which are new. For quite a while we have had a stamp collection box and a pen collection box. Pens get taken to Rymans and are put into their Terracycle collection point. The best alternatives to disposable pens are refillable pens and traditional wooden pencils!



The two newest collection boxes can be found in the corner by the kitchen hatch. The first takes **milk bottle lids only!** I am currently hand sorting every lid as there have been quite a few non-milk lids left in the box! Please make sure that any milk bottle lids you collect are clean. These are being bagged up and will be taken to a collection point from which they will be taken to be recycled. Proceeds from this will go to the Thames Valley Air Ambulance.

The second new box is for **clean foil**. I am also hand-sorting the foil that has been donated. So far it has all been clean, but hasn't all been foil! Blister packs from medication should not be included (these can be taken to Superdrug for recycling). Some peel-off, foil-like lids appear to be foil but seem to be layered with plastic, so should not be included. Please check the packaging if you are not sure, or try tearing the foil. Real foil is easy to tear, but trickier if layered with other materials.

And then we come to Christmas... a wonderful, but often wasteful time of year. In Hart commercial wrapping paper is not recyclable as most is poor quality, has glitter on it, or is layered with plastic! Alternatives **are** available... Fleet Scoop sells both coloured Kraft paper and Christmas patterned Kraft paper, along with paper tape, which is all fully recyclable. At home we now use fabric and ribbons to wrap presents, which we reuse year after year. The Japanese use Furoshiki, which is the name for both their traditional wrapping cloths and the techniques for tying them! There are lots of tips online if you

fancy trying this, but it really is as simple as wrapping a gift up in a square of cloth and tying the ends together over the top!

Similarly, many cards have glitter or embellishments that make them unrecyclable. It is very simple to tear off the front of the card and recycle the back, if you receive any like this. Ultimately, the best we can do is to be mindful when buying anything from food to gifts: is the item made from natural materials, is there an alternative without plastic, can it be purchased from a local business or second hand, is the gift really wanted? If everyone pulled together, the world would benefit from having a much greener Christmas! Happy recycling!



## 'MESSIAH'—HOPE AND SALVATION: THE MEANING OF HANDEL'S MASTERPIECE

Handel's Messiah is well known to us, as it is performed by choirs and choral societies across the world every year. We are very familiar with the sublime music. But how often do the singers—or the audience—stop to think about what it is all about? This new book by Stephen Thornton (a previous minister at Fleet URC) brings to life the meaning behind the music.
