

### **WILDLIFE IN WINTER**

Do you feed the birds in your garden? Approximately half of the UK population do. You don't need a big space, or even a garden to be able to support wildlife. If you have a window and a window sill, you can do it! Did you know that scientists at Oxford University, in collaboration with others, have discovered that in the last 40-50 years great tits' beaks have evolved to be longer in order to reach more easily into garden bird feeders. Isn't that amazing?

Like many people, I derive a great deal of pleasure from putting out bird food and seeing 'my' birds visit and take their fill. After taking part in the RSPB's Big Garden Bird Watch on several occasions, I decided to keep a log of how many different birds visit my garden. I counted them in the same way that they are counted in the Bird Watch, ie the greatest number of any species seen in your garden at any one time. I have seen a total of 28 different species\*, the greatest number of any single species at one time being starlings at 14, and at least 75 individual birds have visited!



The Big Garden Bird Watch will be coming around again from the 24th to the 26th of January. It only takes an hour, so why not take part? In 2024, 9.7 million birds were counted, more than 610,000 people took part, and 12.1 million hours have been spent watching birds since 1979! If you want to take part but don't already put food out for the birds, you might want to start soon... it can take birds a while to find and trust a new food source.

A lot of bird food comes in plastic packaging, but it is perfectly possible to buy it without. Fleet Scoop sells fat balls, meal worms and bird seed 'loose'... just take your own containers (jars, Tupperware, take-away tubs—anything as long as it's clean!) I also buy fat blocks and sunflower seeds online from a company called 'Eyebrook Wild Bird Feeds': http://www.eyebrookwildbirdfeeds.co.uk. Eyebrook are a traditionally run family farm who are passionate about birds and conservation. They blend their seed recipes on the farm, with many of the seeds being homegrown. Their suet comes from another long established family farm with high environmental standards. Delivery and customer service is excellent and all packaging is recyclable and compostable (mine all comes in cardboard boxes or paper sacks). I have also heard good things about Ark Wildlife http://www.arkwildlife.co.uk, but have not tried this company personally.

Why should we feed the birds? Our wildlife needs as much support as it can get. There has been a noticeable lack of insects over the Summer of 2024. Insects form a large part of some birds' and mammals' diets. Bat conservation groups have reported starving and underweight bats, often juveniles. Birds will have been in a similar position. Natural food shortages can occur at any time of year, so feeding our birds all year round helps to ensure that birds survive these hunger gaps. And the reward? Knowing that you are doing your bit to help our British wildlife, along with the pleasure of seeing our feathered friends feasting on tasty morsels. Happy birding!

### STAND BY ME

As you will be aware from previous magazines, members of Fleet URC generously sponsor three children each month through the charity Stand by Me. Stand by Me rescue children from terrible circumstances, and then provide



the love, care and attention they need to thrive, which we have been able to witness in Pau, Arsema and Laurith's progress over the past three years.

For children in countries like Ethiopia, Nepal and Colombia, a journey of several miles on foot is not an excursion but a daily necessity; but protecting their feet is an afterthought and sometimes an impossibility. In these parts of the world, shoes are a privilege. An adequate pair marks the difference between a child who will engage in the joys offered by their childhood, and one who will be hindered and denied by disease and disability.

Stand by Me believe that every child should have comfortable shoes that fit well. Many of the children they welcome into their care have never owned shoes that protect their feet. So every year at Christmas, Stand by Me aim to try to provide each of the over 3,800 children in their care with a new pair of shoes to protect them from harm, and also remind them of the love and lasting support that surrounds them. Just look at the difference it makes:

"This is the first time that I get the opportunity to wear brand new shoes. I used to wear old and plastic shoes that others donated. I can't wait to wear them to school." Hailemariam, aged 7, Ethiopia.

"I am very grateful for the new school shoes I have. They are very nice and shiny. There is no hole in the bottom and my feet remain dry all day." *Justin, aged 5, Kenya*

### 'THE HOLLY AND THE IVY'



The holly and the ivy, When they are both full grown, Of all the trees that are in the wood, The holly bears the crown.

This traditional Christmas carol has been popular for at least two centuries, but what is the significance of the holly and ivy?

Evergreen plants like holly, ivy and mistletoe were used for thousands of years to decorate buildings during the long dark winters. The Romans exchanged evergreen branches in January to wish each other good luck. The ancient Egyptians brought palm branches into their home during the midwinter festivals. In Britain, holly and ivy have been an important part of our Advent and Christmas decorations since at least the 15th and 16th centuries, when they were mentioned regularly in churchwardens' accounts.

The holly tree came to have a rich meaning in Christian symbolism, with the spiky leaves representing Christ's crown of thorns, and the red berries the drops of blood Jesus shed when he died on the cross. In Christian liturgy red is the colour of the Holy Spirit and recalls the fiery tongues that descended upon the Apostles when they received the Holy Spirit. The shape of the holly leaf is also said to resemble a flame.

Like holly, ivy was revered for keeping its leaves over winter, and was likewise associated with eternal life. It became a symbol of love, faithfulness and endurance because of its tenacious hold on surfaces. It has also traditionally been associated with healing, especially with the recovery of sick animals.

The rivalry between the holly and the ivy for mastery of the forest has its origins in ancient folklore. Holly was traditionally seen as a masculine symbol, growing upright and strong, and the ivy, twining and clinging, represented the

feminine. In Christian symbolism the holly is said to represent Jesus Christ, and the ivy his mother, the Virgin Mary. In this traditional carol 'the holly bears the crown', and this may be why we hear no more about the ivy in later verses, which all refer to Christ's crucifixion. It would seem that this much-loved carol does not celebrate Christmas at all, but Christ's life and death on the cross.







### FLEET URC AND PALANI MISSION—A PARTNERSHIP MADE IN HEAVEN!

Our curry evenings to raise money for the Palani Mission, situated in the Tamil Nadu state in southern India, have become a regular feature of

our church calendar. They started life as cookery demonstrations by chef Saju Mathew, who cooked some of his grandmother's recipes which the audience then enjoyed in a meal. He also produced booklets of the recipes containing full cooking instructions, which were sold in aid of the Mission.

The cookery demonstrations later developed into full-scale Indian meals, which are so popular and enthusiastically supported by our church family and friends. Tickets are sold out within days of going on sale, and every penny of money raised from sales, gift aid receipts and food takeaways from the leftovers is sent to the Mission.

From the outset we decided that the money raised should be spent effectively and that projects should not only be self-sustaining, but produce further benefits to the local community. In 2016 our then minister, Ruth Dillon, accompanied by Bee and



Gordon Griffiths, visited Revd John Abraham, leader of the Palani Mission, and agreed a programme of work to support the Mission in spreading the love and knowledge of Jesus Christ by immersing themselves totally in local culture.

From this inaugural visit came sponsorship of midwifery training, goat husbandry producing milk and meat, clothing and bric-a-brac manufacture providing work and sales. Subsequent years have seen new metal constructed houses to replace the mud brick ones, corrugated metal roofs to replace tree branches, midwives and community nurses employed by the Mission Hospital, a seven hundred foot freshwater well at the Mission site providing clean water for everybody, and a series of medical camps.

The needs and work are never-ending, and money raised in 2024 will sponsor the training of a community nurse, more metal framed houses to combat the monsoon weather, and possibly a medical camp.

The next curry night will be held in the Spring of 2025—watch our website for the date!
