



THE SCOTS KIRK, PARIS

Did you know that right in the centre of Paris there is the only Church of Scotland congregation in France? It is an English language Protestant Church which welcomes all and aims to serve the needs of people of different nationalities and denominations who live throughout the Paris region, as well as visitors to that beautiful city.



The original building on the site, 17 Rue Baynard, 75008, Paris, was built in 1885, and has attracted some famous people who have worshipped there, including American President Woodrow Wilson, British Prime Minister David Lloyd George, and Eric Liddell, the famous Scottish Olympic athlete who preferred to preach in the Scots

Kirk rather than race on a Sunday in the 1924 Paris Games. This experience was recounted in the film 'Chariots of Fire'.

In 1940, following the German occupation of Paris, the then Minister Donald Caskie moved to Marseille, where he held services in the Seamen's Mission and became a member of the French Resistance. Betrayed, arrested and sentenced to death by the Gestapo, his life was saved by a German Pastor. After the war he returned to Paris to continue his Ministry. His fascinating story is told in the book 'The Tartan Pimpernel'.

The Kirk is still on the original site, but because the old church had serious

structural problems, in 1995 the Church of Scotland decided to 'sell' the site to a developer with permission to construct private apartments, in return for demolishing the old church and providing an empty shell on ground/basement level for a new church. This was achieved, and the church re-opened in 2002 with a beautiful new worship space.



If ever you are in Paris, I encourage you to visit the Scots Kirk. Services are held at 11 am each Sunday, and visitors are given a warm and friendly welcome, as we were when we attended a service recently.

'LE WEEKEND' 2025— FUN, FOOD AND FELLOWSHIP IN FRANCE

On Friday 2nd May ten people from Wessex left Newhaven for Dieppe, and travelled on to Luneray in Normandy to take part in the first Le Weekend in France since 2018. Most of those ten were first time participants: some were fluent in French, but for others it was their first time abroad.

We were warmly welcomed at the United Protestant Church of France in Luneray, where we greeted old friends and met new ones. We had tea and cake and met our hosts for the weekend; then we went our separate ways for an evening with our host families.

Alex and I stayed with our old friends Sophie and Francois Verhoeven, who have been involved with Le Weekend since 2010. We enjoyed a relaxing evening with them, with great discussions around the table.

On Saturday morning about thirty of us gathered around a table to discuss our chosen theme, 'The Creative Word'. We were joined by church members from Rouen and others from Luneray, as well as by our Moderator, Revd Dr Michael Hopkins and his daughter, who had crossed overnight. Michael had prepared some questions to start us off, first considering the Creative Word in Genesis and then, after a break, God's Living Word in Jesus. The discussion was translated so that everyone could understand.

Sophie had organised the church members to provide hospitality and food for all throughout the weekend. We had lunch, then set off for a tour of a local chateau, Chateau Bosmelet, which has a history dating back to the 13th century, including being used as a V1 and V2 base during World War II. The Resistance found out, smuggled out the details, and the site was bombed extensively by the RAF.

The present owner, Alain Germain, a noted theatre costume designer of the '70s and '80s, bought and restored the

chateau, and now he holds exhibitions of his and others' works of art and design.

We returned to Luneray and enjoyed singing together in French and English until it was time for dinner, accompanied by good wine.

On Sunday we wandered round the Luneray market before the church service, which was led by Pr Charles Klagba. Michael Hopkins assisted with communion. Charles shared an encouraging message, that the Risen Jesus comes to us even if we have got lost in the past, and calls us to follow Him with love. A jazz band played during the service and afterwards, as we enjoyed drinks with the church community before lunch. There was plenty of food for everyone, and then it was time to say our goodbyes and set off back to Dieppe for our ferry home.

This was a really encouraging weekend. After Brexit and Covid, Sophie in France and I in England had some struggles as we tried to arrange Le Weekend. But I am sure that the Living Word was shared amongst us in both languages, assuring us that the Risen Christ meets us at Le Weekend, and that the love of God is present with us all, no matter what language we speak.

MAKE DO AND MEND

As I write this article, Britain has been remembering VE Day, or Victory in Europe Day. May the 8th marks 80 years since the end of war in Europe. One of the great wartime maxims was 'Make Do and Mend' as resources were so scarce. These days, we have become a more throw-away society with cheap goods and cheap fashion meaning that items don't last as long, but as they're so cheap it doesn't matter... does it?

Unfortunately, our world has finite resources and whilst we are able to recycle many materials and grow others, there is still a limit to what the world can provide us with. Since the 1970s the world's population has increased by

120%, but the world is unable to increase the rate at which it provides for us. This has led scientists to describe what they call 'Earth Overshoot Day'. This is computed by dividing the planet's biocapacity (the amount of ecological resources Earth is able to generate that year), by humanity's Ecological Footprint (humanity's demand for that year), and multiplying by 365, the number of days in a year. 1971 saw humanity



using a year's worth of Earth's resources by Christmas Day, but by 2024, we had used a year's worth of Earth's resources by August 1st. That is quite a sobering statistic. See overshootday.org for more information.

I fear that cheap brands like Temu and Shein, or even some high street brands, which flood the market with poor quality products tempt the general public to spend unwisely. Where we can, we should avoid this and buy quality products that will last.



Programmes like 'The Repair Shop' showcase the skills of artisans who can breathe new life into treasured objects in the spirit of Make Do and Mend, but did you know that Fleet offers its very own Repair Café? Fleet Repair Café aims to divert waste from landfill; save carbon emissions produced by reduced landfilling and recycling; educate local people on where best to take unfixable items; provide a space where local crafts people are valued for their skills, and save

customers money! Fleet Repair Café takes place on the first Saturday of every month in the Harlington Centre, Fleet Road. Repairs are free, but there are donation buckets for those who are able to and would like to donate money to help cover running costs. April's statistics show a 69.8% success rate, saving an estimated £1,460.00 for the general public, with 66kg of waste avoided using 91 volunteer hours. More information can be found on their Facebook page.

Why not take along an item in need of some TLC and see if they can help? They do not look at white goods, petrol items or mobile phones but will look at electrical items, electronic items, mechanical items, IT fixes, textiles, garden tools and sharpening and bikes. I'm sure they would appreciate skilled volunteers too, if you have some time to spare once a month! Let's hope that the spirit of 'Make Do and Mend' lives on.

PALANI MISSION PARTNERSHIP

Our journey with Palani Mission started in early 2016 when Mary Mathew told our church meeting about the work of her sister, Sheeba and her husband, Revd John Abraham at the mission in Tamil Nadu

Province. As a result, our church set up the Friends of Palani group to discuss ways to fundraise and Ruth Dillon, our then minister, made plans to visit India to oversee any project work.

Ruth travelled with Bee and Gordon Griffiths to India and set up a goat husbandry project, clothing and accessory manufacturing facility, recruited two local girls for midwifery training, and established a link with a Catholic nunnery that cared for disabled and disadvantage people of all ages. Our partnership was thus forged and continues to thrive.



The initial work has been expanded to include construction of a well at the Mission

Church for clean drinking water for all, to build sturdy houses, and to hold medical camps at regular intervals where the poor can access free healthcare.

To date, we have raised more than £30,000 of assistance, the mainstays being Saju's charity curry nights, along with donations from individuals and local organisations.



Visiting the sick at home

Our most recent curry night was supported by over 75 people, who gave generously for the meal and bought raffle tickets to raise a combined total of £2,400. This represents the most raised at a single event so far, and will fund two years' training of a community nurse, three more houses/village churches, and several medical camps. We were blessed by having Deepa and John join us on the evening. Deepa is the daughter of Revd John and Sheeba, who sent the following message:

'Thank you very much for all the support given by you over the last years. We are so grateful for your generosity. May God richly bless your church in Fleet and you all. You are always in our prayers.'


